Rofermatory May Sall Melatelas The Farm Department at the Ontario Reformatory is considering the advisability of disposing of the herd of Holstein dairy cattle owned by the institution at Guelph, and replacing them with Shorthorns, which in addition to providing the reformatory with an adequate milk supply, would eventually provide stock fit for beef purposes. The present herd consists of 55 Holsteins, a breed that is hard to improve on for dairy purposes, but one that is of little use for beef. 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
