Chapter Officers Installed The installation of officers for 1928 of Halton Chapter, Royal Arch Masons, was conducted last Friday evening by Rt. Ex. Comp. John F. Marr of Guelph, assisted by V. Ex. Comp. J. T. Cameron, Ex. Comp. J. H. Wallace and V. Ex. Comp. H. G. Meir.

At the conclusion of the ceremonies there was the usual banquet and toast list. These proceedings were enlivened by songs and selections from the three Jacks, harmonium, banjo and guitar.

Equalization of Assessment Judge Elliot's award on the appeal of Oakville and Trafalgar against the equalization of the assessment of Halton by that body last Friday.

The Judge emphasized that the wrong method of the assessors should be corrected if the equalization, with the large expenditure of public money, was to be avoided. Further, the matter could be dealt with more easily if the assessors assessed at the same percentage of value in each municipality, which they did not in Halton, and this was especially noticeable in Nelson and Trafalgar, especially south of the Toronto and Hamilton highway, which properties were not assessed higher than 15 per cent. to 25 per cent. of actual value, and some as low as 10 per cent. This was unfair to the northerly parts of the two townships, where the percentage was much higher.

Business and income assessment are not included in the Judge's figures, as he did not think, and counsel agreed, that the Act did not authorize their inclusion. The figures are:

The above finding shows that Esqueping holds about 90 per cent. of the gain made by the equalization of 1926 making the township saving in the county levy about \$27,000 for the years 1926 and 1927, and a saving of \$11,500 each year after paying the equalization to the extent of \$1750 in the county rate for this year. The town was given a substantial reduction owing to the business and income assessment not being included in the county assessment.
