Report of Coroner's Inspector

The report of C. H. Turner, Coroner's Inspector for Halton County gives some rather interesting information. Between Nov. 11th and Dec. 13, Mr. Turner beside calling on schools and doing general propaganda work, called on 300 individual farmers, whose total acreage was 1000 acres. The areas ran from 2 1/2 acres to 4 lots. An indication of the extent of plowing done in the county may be gleaned from the fact that of 986 acres of corn land only 104 acres were unplowed when the inspector called and much of this would be plowed before freeze up. Present indications are that the farmers are co-operating with the inspector and by so doing will prevent serious loss from this insect next year.

Lord Mayor to Receive Canadian Farmers' Party

A reception by the Lord Mayor of Liverpool will be tendered the members of the Canadian Farmers' Marketing Tour when the party reaches Liverpool in the middle of January, according to cable advice received this week by the Canadian National Railways, which is organizing the tour. The Lord Mayor advises that he will receive the party officially at four o'clock on the afternoon of his arrival there.

Problems affecting the marketing of Canadian butter, eggs, fruit, vegetables and other products, will be made the subject of discussion at a special joint conference which has been arranged between the members of the farmers' party from Canada and representatives of the Manches for provision trade who deal particularly in Canadian products. This will be an opportunity for clearing up many points regarding the methods to be adopted in the shipping and marketing of Canadian products. While at Manchester, the Canadian party is to be taken charge of for one entire day by the officials of the Co-operative Wholesale Society, the largest of its kind in the world, where a special inspection will be made of the Society's Sun Flour Mills, the largest in Europe.

The Manchester Ship Canal directors are planning to give a luncheon to the party on January 19, and a trip of inspection is to be made over the famous canal and the extensive marketing facilities in connection therewith.

Characterizing the tour as the greatest educational trip of its kind, E. S. Archibald, director of experimental farms for the Dominion of Canada, who returned last week from the Old Country, commented on the itinerary which has been arranged for the Canadian farmers. He took occasion to review the itinerary while in England, and stated: "This itinerary is an exceptionally good one, and should be of very distinct value to those who participate. In fact, it should be the greatest educational trip of its kind."
