Problems uffecting the marketing of Canadian butter, eggs, fruit, vegetables and other products, will be made the subject of discussion at special joint conference which has been arranged between the members of the furmers' party from Canada and representatives of the Manches ter provision trade who deal partioularly in Canadian products. This will be an opportunity for clearing up . many points regarding the methods to be adopted in the shipping and marketing of Canadian Products.

While at Manchester, the Canadian narty is to be faken charge of for one entire day by the officials of the Co operative Wholesale Society, the largest of its kind in the world, where a special inspection will be made of the Society's Sun Flour Mills, the largest in Europe.

The Manchester Ship Canal directors are planning to give a luncheon to the party on January 19, and a trip of inspection is to be made over the famous canal and the extensive marketing facilities in connection

Characterizing the tour as the greatest educational trip of its kind, E. S. Archibald, director of experimental farms for the Dominion of Canada, who returned last week from the Old Country, commented on the itinerary which has been arranged for the Canadian farmers. He took occasion to review the itinerary while in England, and states: "This itinerary is an excep-tionally good one, and should be of very distinct value to those who participate.
