More Pictures This Year

Train Hit Truck

at Mount Pleasant Two Men Seriously Injured— Five Cattle Killed

Two men were seriously hurt and five head of cattle were killed outright when a motor truck was wrecked by the engine of a passenger train at Mount Pleasant two miles east of Norval at about 9:40 a.m. Monday.

The injured men are Fred Moore, of Rockwood, and J. Clark, of Campbellville. Moore was driving the truck and Clark owned the cattle which were being conveyed from Rockwood to the market in Toronto.

The truck which was smashed to pieces, was owned by O. Ostrander, of Rockwood. The railroad engine was damaged by the collision, but was able to proceed on its eastward journey and took the injured men to Brampton. It was the regular passenger train from the west due here at 9:45 o'clock.

Moore and Clark were met at the depot by Dr. D. L. Huggie, the railway physician, and taken to the Peel Memorial hospital where they were attended by Jfr. Huggie and Dr. John Smith. Clark is seriously cut about the heart and is in a very serious condition, Clark being the most seriously hurt and his condition is alarming.

Moore was able to say in explanation of the accident that this morning was misty and he did not see the train approaching. The crossing is not regarded as a particularly dangerous one.

General News

For the first time in many years Dufferin county jail has seven prisoners. The usual number is one, and for months at a time the institution is empty. The present inmates are charged with theft, and three are awaiting transfer to other places.

Game Warden Garnet Magill stated Monday that, excepting fox, the fur crop of the Algoma district is going to be very poor. No beaver and very few fisher will be trapped this year was the prediction.

Elma School, No. 2, at Listowel, Ont., has been awarded a silver cup by the Canadian Horticultural Council, having won the first prize three years in succession for the best kept and planted school grounds.

In a sermon at High Park Presbyterian church Sunday night, Rev. Dr. A. S. Grant, secretary of the Board of Missions of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, declared that he had seen evidences of great prosperity in the dominion-wide tour he had just completed.

A crib 110 feet long and 18 feet wide has been launched and is ready to be sunk in 14 feet of water in the harbor at Oakville. The cribwork will be continued to about four feet above the water level.

Another section of Tmfalgur township is about to receive electric light and power that of the district along the townline between Trafalgar and Toronto townships, and also along the Middle road, west.

Weston gets a new industry in the Corrugated Cattle Cakes and Oil Seed Company, which on December 31st, broke ground in the north end of the town, on the C.N.R. and C.P.R. sidings. The new enterprise calls for an initial outlay of \$30,000 and this will be added to as the business increases.
