Georgetown Juniors Win Two from Milton—Intermediates Win from Orangeville and Lose to Guelph. The Georgetown Juniors gave a grand exhibition of fast, clean hockey at Milton last Wednesday night when they defeated Milton Juniors by the score of 5 to 1. The first period opened with Georgetown pressing the locals and showing sharper shot at Hewston. King netted the first goal for Georgetown on a shot from the wing and before the gong sounded for the end of the period Tost added another making the score Georgetown 2, Milton 0. The second period was a repetition of the preceding one and Reid struck handily his way through for the third goal for Georgetown. Milton tried hard but the continued back-checking of their opponents played havoc with their getaways. About the middle of the period Gibbons scored another making the score Georgetown 4, Milton 0 at the end of the second period. The Georgetown team opened the final period with a burst of speed that has characterized most of their games and had the Milton team dazzled for the greater part of the period. Huffman netted Georgetown's fifth goal and shortly after Irwin tallied the lone one for the home team. The score amply indicates which team had the better of the game. Milton—Goal, Hewston; defence, Wilson and Peyle; c. Clements, wings, Irwin and Glenwilliams, subs, Lumber and Hardoc. Georgetown—Goal, Hallway; defence, Walters and Gibbons, c. Reid, wings, Tost and King, subs, Alcott, Huffman and Cole. On Thursday night Georgetown defeated Orangeville in an Intermediate O.H.A. game at the Arena by the score of 6 to 5 in ten minutes overtime. The game was not an exhibition of good hockey and the Georgetown team did not display the brand of hockey they have been handing out in previous games. The score at the end of the first period was Georgetown 2 Orangeville 1. Orangeville came back in the second period and scored four while Georgetown failed to find the nets, making the score at the end of the second frame, Orangeville 5, Georgetown 2. The third period was much better hockey and Georgetown took the lead and scored twice. Gibbons added 3 goals making the score at full time 5-5. In the first five minutes overtime Georgetown scored the winning goal and the visitors failed to tally in the remaining five minutes of play, making the score Georgetown 6, Orangeville 5. In the return game with Milton on Friday night Georgetown Juniors won their sixth consecutive victory by defeating the boys from the County Centre by the score of 9 to 2. The game was fast and clean with the locals having the edge of the play all through the game. In the first period the locals scored five, Reid getting 2, Gibbons, Tost and Walters each one. In the second period Georgetown failed to score and Milton succeeded in getting the rubber past Hallway for their first counter. In the third period Georgetown again came back with a burst of speed and scored in quick succession while Milton only scored one. For Georgetown Gibbons got 2, and Walters and Reid one each, making the final score Georgetown 9, Milton 2. In the return game with Guelph on Monday night at the Guelph Arena Georgetown were defeated by the score of 4 to 2. Regarding the game the following press dispatch to the Mail and Empire says: Pressed hard for the full 60 minutes of play, Guelph intermediates had a hard time disposing of Georgetown Monday night, the final count in their 3-to-2 victory being netted just 10 seconds before the final bell. Atcheson did the trick when he let loose with a long shot from the red line the puck taking a hop and bouncing over Ireland's foot. It was Guelph's seventh win in eight starts, and assured them of a place in the group play-off. For the first period the game was rather draggy, but after Guelph had jumped away to a 2-to-1 lead both outfits stepped into the fray in real earnest in the second chapter, from then on there was excitement aplenty. Georgetown played a better competition game than the Orange and Black but they failed to display the same speed, and even with their individual efforts Guelph had more shots on goal, particularly in the final chapter, when they peppered Ireland continually without results. Despite the fact that the Georgetown custodian suffered a bad injury to his knee and had to be carried off the ice in the second period, he returned to play a brilliant game between the posts. Salmon, the visitors' speedy center, was easily the best man on the ice, and starred along with Hepburn and Blackburn. For Guelph, Hayes turned in a nice performance in goal, while Mitchell, "Chubby" Brill and Atcheson, who counted two of the three goals, were most effective. Hewitt and Hepburn accounted for Georgetown's two markers, "Curly" Brill getting the old one of Guelph's three. The teams: Georgetown—Goal, Ireland; defence, Blackburn and J. the defeat of Georgetown at Guelph on Monday night and if the breaks of the game had been evenly divided the score would have been reversed. The injury to Ireland's knee will keep him out of the game for awhile. He was playing a grand game and we hope he will be on hand to meet Guelph in the play-off.
