### Accepting Bottle of Whiskey is Risky Business

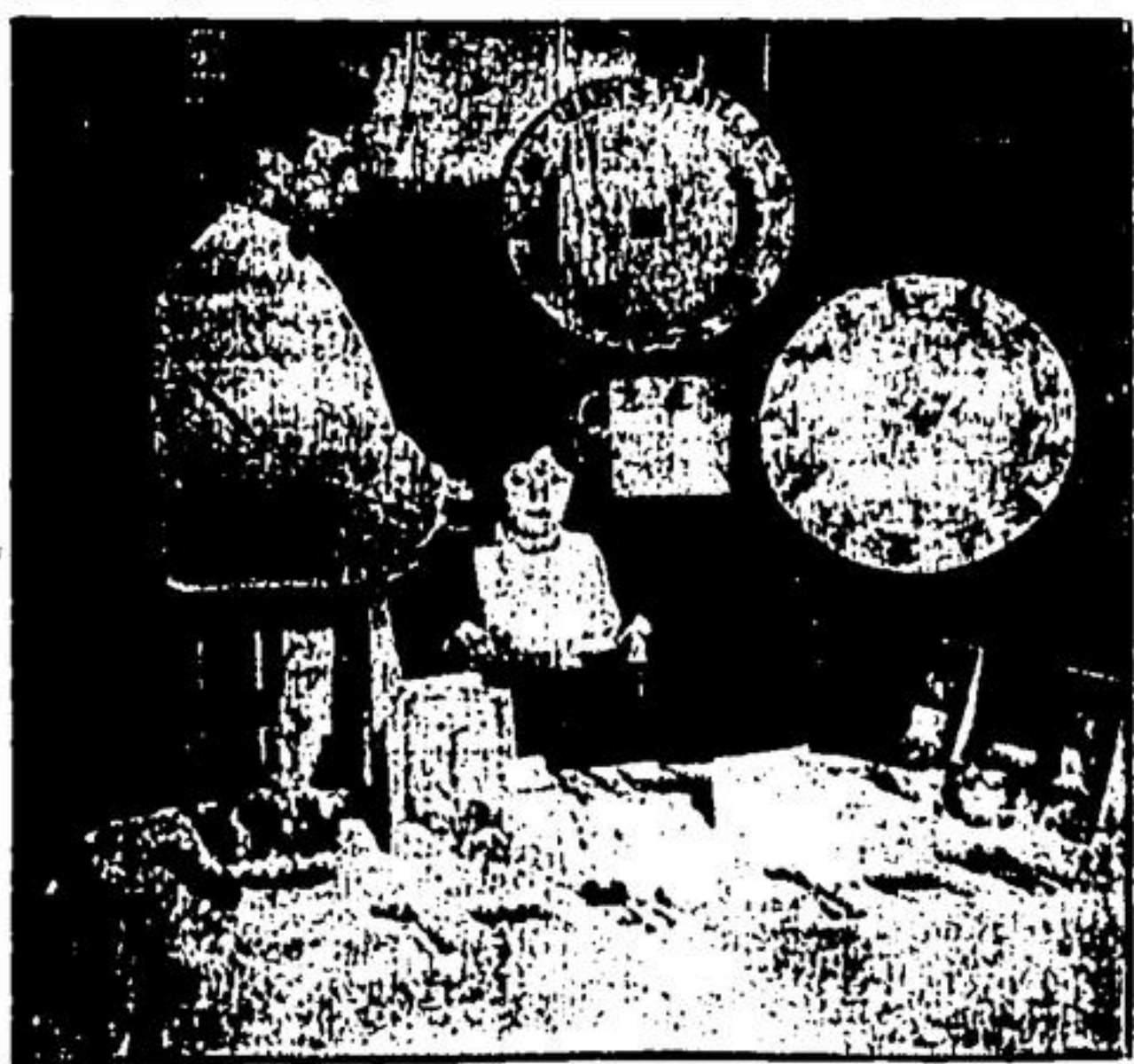
Take a tip from D. B. Hanna—if your friend hands you a bottle of liquor as a gift you'd be wise to say, "Thanks, old man, awfully good of you, but I'm not taking any."  
For, according to the chairman of the liquor control board of Ontario, the man who takes a bottle of booze as a gift carries it on him or in his car is taking big chances.  
"The law is that the man who has a permit buys it so that he may purchase liquor for his own use. If he gives any to his friends it should be consumed in his home. If his friend takes a bottle from him and gets into a motor car accident, the police find the bottle on him or in the car and he therefore is guilty of having liquor in an illegal place."  
"What if he has a liquor permit on him?"  
"That does not save him. He would not be able to show that the bottle in his possession was bought on his permit."  
So the chairman figures that the safe way is for the citizens to observe the law and fight all temptations to accept such wet gifts.

**Our Juniors Lose to St. Michael's in Two Fast Games**  
St. Michael's College, champions of the Preparatory School group of the Junior O.H.A., gathered a four goal lead on Georgetown at the Mutual Street Arena, Toronto, last Friday night, in their quest for higher honors.  
Both teams started with unbroken records, having swept through their group schedules without defeat and on their play they deserved the honor. St. Michael's had a decided advantage as Georgetown was lost on the large ice surface.  
In the first period Sullivan landed the only goal, after fifteen minutes of play, on a solo dash. Checking and passing was much in evidence for any other counts. In the second period the Irish were at their best, running in three in a row, Regan and Convey combining for the first, while Convey counted the second. The Irishers' third goal of the period was of a passing play for a goal, and for the goal guardian's skate on a pass from behind the nets, and it slipped between the posts.  
Reid and Walters started Georgetown on a rampage by working a passing play for a goal, and for the last five minutes of the second session they kept play around the Saint's citadel. St. Michael's tried to add to their margin in the last period, but Georgetown played a defensive game and Convey was only student to get away for a count.  
In the return game here on Monday evening our juniors were again defeated by St. Michael's in one of the best exhibitions of hockey seen in the Arena this season. There was a capacity crowd and our boys put up a splendid fight but was unable to score but one counter while the visitors accounted for four. Georgetown boys have nothing to be ashamed of in their defeat by St. Michael's.  
Walters and Gibbons were outstanding figures for the locals giving the invaders all sorts of trouble both offensive and defensive. Reid at centre and Toet and King on the wings also put up a splendid game for Georgetown, while Holloway in goal stopped a number of hot ones.  
The capacity crowd was treated to a good exhibition and while the big majority were disappointed at the result, yet all will admit the superiority of the St. Michael's students.
