**Enjoyed Evening of Song**

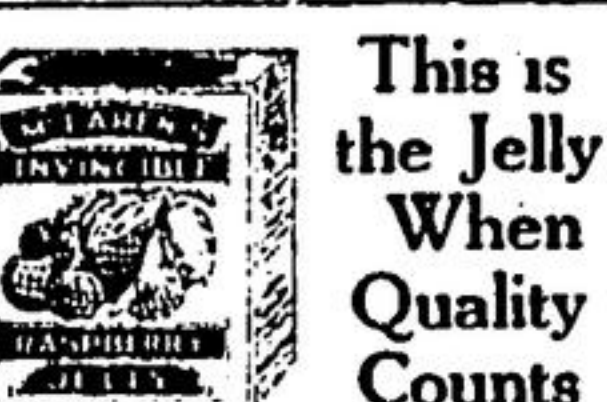

Just one of the news items which are appearing in papers quite too often these days throughout the Dominion. And what is the reason?
