### What You Should Know About Tuberculosis

Discovered early and properly treated, tuberculosis is one of the most curable diseases. Many deaths from tuberculosis occur each year. Putting these two statements together, it is evident that either the disease is not being discovered early, or they are not being properly treated. There are no secrets in the medical profession, and so the physicians in one place have the same knowledge as physicians elsewhere, but the physician cannot help the person who does not come to him.

Those who follow our advice and have a complete physical examination once a year, give their family physician an opportunity to discover tuberculosis, cancer or other curable diseases at their earliest and most curable stage. Those who have not followed this advice should know something about the earliest signs of tuberculosis, so that they may recognize them and secure proper advice right away.

Not everyone with the following symptoms has tuberculosis, but the presence of one or more of them is sufficient to arouse suspicion and to send the person to his family physician to find out the cause. Delay means losing the opportunity for cure and, at the same time, endangers the lives of others.

Any cough which persists for a month or more is suspicious.

Any cough accompanied by a slight fever, particularly if it recurs, is not to be disregarded.

A general feeling of not being well, with or without the loss of strength or weight, should always be investigated.

Blood spitting is often an early symptom. It frequently occurs as the first symptom in persons apparently well.

Continued upset of digestion, particularly if accompanied by a cough, also a loss of weight require investigation.

It is better to be always on the safe side. Pay attention to Nature's warnings and preserve your health.

### Ahead of His Time

A Boston newspaper dated sixty-one years ago contains the following report:

The authorities who apprehended this criminal are to be congratulated, and it is to be hoped that his punishment will be prompt and fitting, that it may serve as an example to other conscienceless schemers who enrich themselves at the expense of their fellow-creatures."

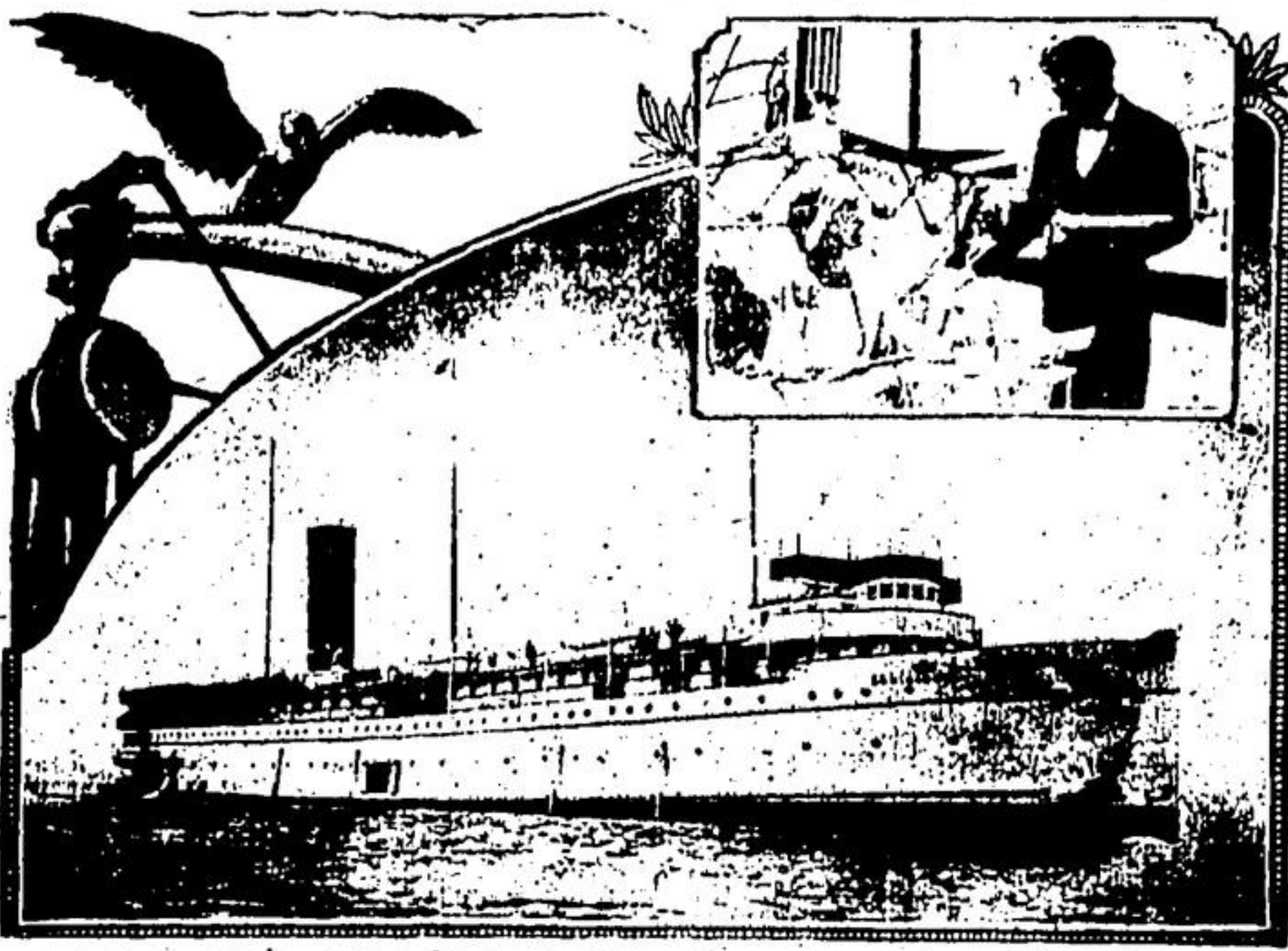

### Through Canada's Inland Ocean



The Great Lakes for a summer holiday have no equal. Contrary to the generally prevailing opinion that the automobile and touring are the greatest attractions, these large bodies of fresh water really inland seas, are holding their own, indeed, by those who know it is said that they are doing more.

From Port McNicoll to the Head of the Lakes, is practically an ocean voyage. The great white steamers of the Canadian Pacific Railway are operated the same as the huge ocean liners. At Port McNicoll the visitor sees a man manly harbor, surrounded by a village which has been developed from the original within the last twenty years. About an hour and a half after leaving port, a huge island is lost in the soft enfolding darkness. Stars come out, and a white moon floods the lake with an ethereal beauty. All is quiet—a friendly, intimate quiet—broken here and there by a merry laugh, a passing footstep, the hum of the great engine and the spark on the wireless up above. A little later we pass the protruding Bruce peninsula, then the Manitoulin Island, the home of the Great Spirit. In the distance can be seen the blinking light of the mariners' guides, the houses at Cabot's Head, Lonely Island, the Flower Pots and in the further distance ahead, Cove Island, the marking point of the entrance to Lake Huron.

These steamships, the "Kewauqua," "Manitoba," and "Assiniboia" of the Canadian Pacific service are first-class in every way, and ply these inland waters from May 21st, to September 23rd. The journey occupies the better part of three days, with every wave bringing further charm and amusement at the unfolding beauty of the trip.
