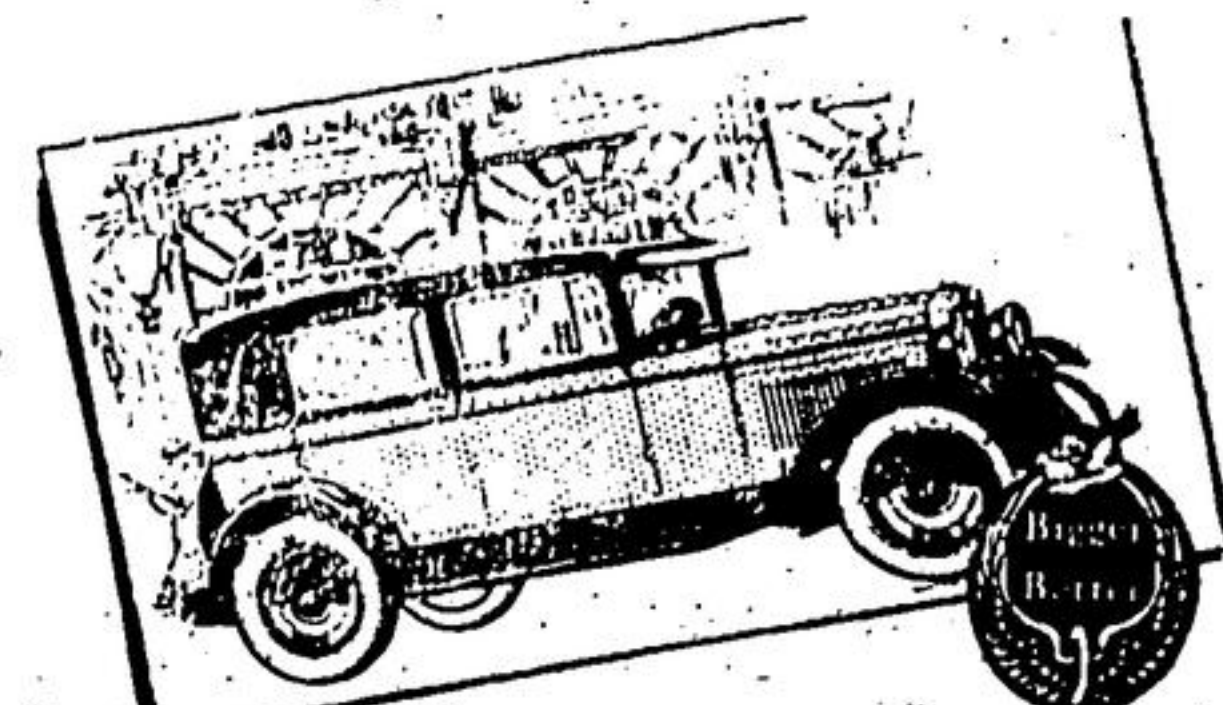

Have the Law!

The diseases requiring quarantine placarding under the provisions of the Public Health Act are: Plague, Cholera, Cholera, Choleriform Meningitis, Diphtheria, German measles, Leprosy, Measles, Mumps, Scarlet Fever, Smallpox, Whooping Cough. The medical officer of health, within six hours after he has received notice of the existence in any house of any of the above diseases shall cause the said house to be placarded and quarantined. For failure to report the above diseases to the M.O.H. a penalty of not less than \$25 and not more than \$100 shall apply.
