Streetsville Safe
Looted by Robbers
Burglars forced their way into the postoffice at Streetsville early Sunday morning, smashed open the safe and stole \$20 in cash, \$300 in stamps and \$4,000 worth of gold bonds and certificates, property of citizens of Streetsville that had been stored there for safe keeping.
The safe, it is stated, is an old one, being secured with plate of steel across the face of the door which bore a lock. This lock was broken off and access to the safe was then simple matter. No person resides in the postoffice building. It is on the main street and there are no police or watchmen on duty at night after midnight in the village.
It is believed the robbery occurred at about 2:30 a.m. Two suspicious characters were observed hanging around the streets about midnight and at the time stated a truck was seen to leave the place.
It is believed the robbers intend to make an arrest shortly. The robbers are believed to have come from Toronto.
The bonds and securities stolen from the safe are not negotiable and therefore no loss will be sustained by the owners.

Here and There

Forty-five years of faithful service to the Canadian Pacific Railway were honored recently when George Stephen, former lumber agent of the company, was presented by George Stephens, freight traffic manager, with a purse of gold, contributed by Mr. Fowler's colleagues in the railway's freight traffic offices east of Chicago in the United States and east of Fort William in Canada.
Purgis--A special train of 35 cars left for Vancouver and points en route the other day with over 11,000 consignments of washing machines and burn equipment. This trainload, the largest of its kind ever to originate in Canada, is a Purgis firm and was handled by the Canadian Pacific Railway with a special train purging to Montreal, Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Calgary, Edmonton and other centres. Nearly 600 consignments were for rural communities.
Immigrants are beginning to pour through the Port of Saint John and Montreal en route to Ontario and the West. With the arrival of the Canadian Pacific Express Montreal and Montreal recently, in the past few months, 600 extra cars of the best type have been distributed. Among these were British farm machinery, 400 extra cars of the best type have been distributed.
Toronto--In accordance with his promise to Western Ontario tobacco growers, Hon. W. R. Motherwell has appointed a committee to investigate all phases of the tobacco-growing industry, for which two of the commissioners have already been named. The committee will be given every phase of the industry, from seedling to marketing, and one of the important features will be an effort to ascertain the best method of operating a proposed co-operative marketing board.
Port Arthur--Eventually Canada will produce 2,000,000 bushels of wheat and will have no difficulty in finding a market for it, according to J. A. Gower, President and General Manager of the United Grain Growers Limited, and formerly Minister of Agriculture for the Dominion. Referring to the development of Western Canada, Mr. Gower said that the country is the world where so great a development had taken place in the past few years and that it is a country having such great possibilities.
In order to meet the increasing popularity of the Canadian Rockies among tourists, and also to aid in developing trans-continental travel, the Canadian Pacific Railway will run a quintette of trains across the Dominion from Montreal, Toronto, Regina, Winnipeg, Vancouver, and Victoria this coming summer. These trains will be "The Trans-Canada Limited," "The Imperial," "The Mountaineer," "The Rocky Mountain Express," and "The Coast-to-Coast." The Trans-Canada and the Mountaineer will be all-sleeping-car trains.
Vancouver--"Maize," the famous white Leghorn fowl, owned by the University of British Columbia farm, officially known as Hen No. 6, the world's champion layer, laid 351 eggs in 1927, proving a substantial revenue producer for the University of British Columbia. The bird, which was purchased by the University from a peddler of poultry stock from Maize returned to the University \$2,225. Two of her broods fetched \$500 each when sold to Ohio poultry raisers, while another brood sold in New Jersey for \$1,000. The University receipts on sale of pedigreed British Columbia stock totaled \$7,225 for the year.
