

Halton Sheep Breeders Organize

At the call of the Agricultural Representative, thirty-six sheep breeders of Halton County met in the Farmers' Building, Milton, on Monday afternoon last and organized a county sheep breeders organization.

H. W. Wade of Toronto and Jas. Toller of Paris addressed the meeting. Mr. Wade dealt with the extent of the sheep industry in Ontario. Of the 180,000 farms only 40,000 keep sheep and about 5 per cent of those breed pure bred. He laid stress on the importance of good foundation stock free from internal and external parasites. He announced the details of operation of the new Provincial Sheep Clubs. Only six counties namely, Wellington, North Simcoe, Halton, Hastings, Lanark and Hanover are to have clubs in 1928. If the scheme proves satisfactory more counties will be added in 1929.

Mr. Toller stressed the importance of the campaign against external parasites and also discussed at length the rain grazing policy as carried on by the Dominion Department.

The directors appointed were as follows:—

President—C. Scott, Campbellville; H. H. T. David, Irving, Campbellville.

Esqueving—Art Wilson, North; Jno. Robertson, Acton.

Trafalgar—Joe Wilcott, Milton; Jas. Wilson, Milton.

Nelson—Clarence Wood, Freema; Walter Readhead, Milton.

These directors will meet and appoint the various officers. The main object of the organization is to develop an area where good sheep could be bred and raised free from disease may be procured in quantity for export purposes.

Here and There

(28) David J. Gowans has been appointed assistant general manager of the Montreal office of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Announcement was made recently. Mr. Gowans was previously in charge of the Montreal office of the Montreal, St. Lawrence and Atlantic Railway. Vancouver—The first radio telephone conversation between Vancouver and Great Britain took place on Thursday, March 22nd when a local business firm talked to a representative of the firm in London. Each could hear the other distinctly, they said. The call lasted four minutes and cost 27c. This conversation was said to be the longest ever made in the British Empire, spanning a distance of 7,000 miles.

John G. Stratton, director of winter sports at the Chateau Frontenac, Quebec, states that the winter season just concluded there was the best in the history of the city. More skiers than ever, New York, New England States, Chicago and even as far south as Washington, D.C., were seen. Practically all came to an end with the Eastern International Dog Derby February 27th which commenced at the end of December.

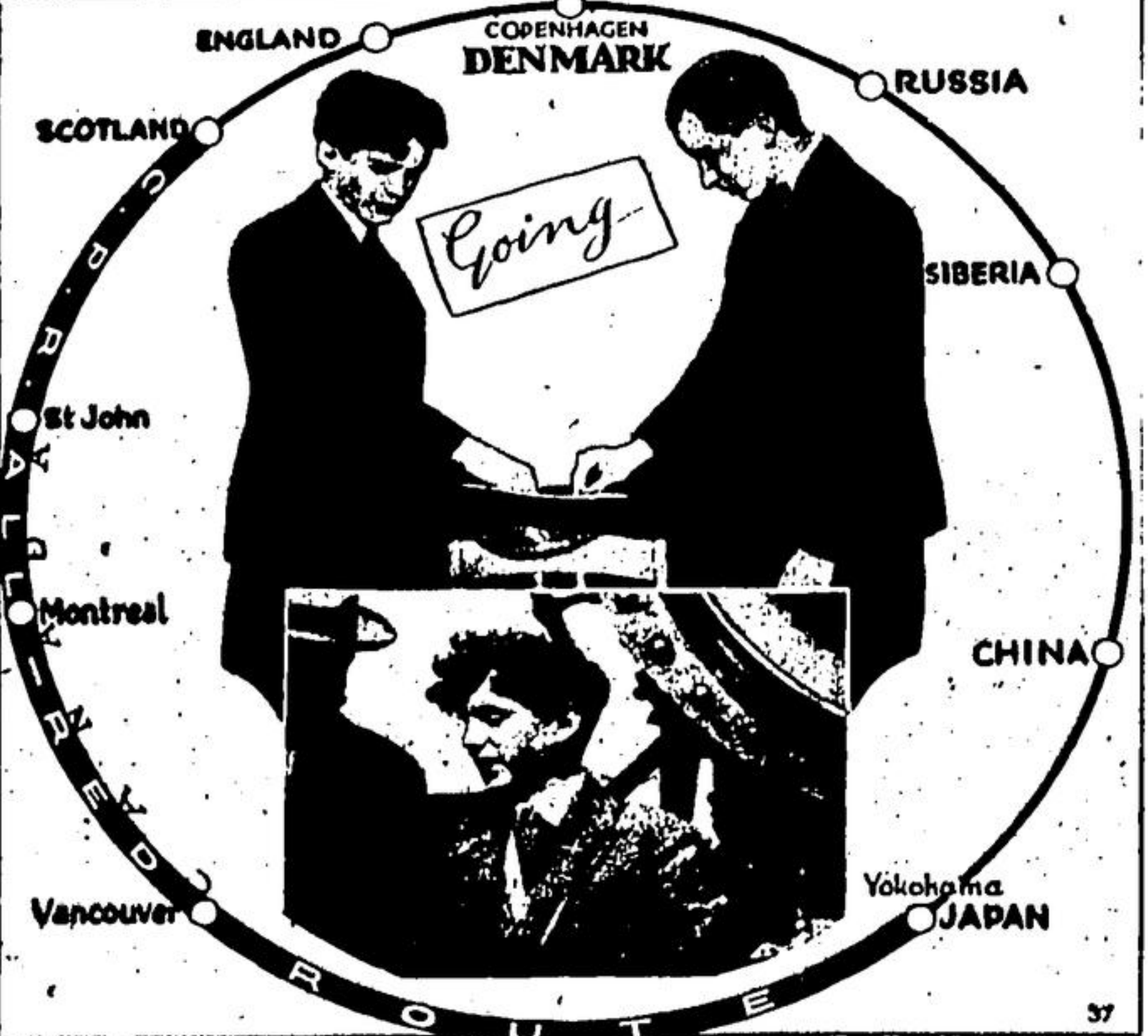
A contract for the building of a new steamer for the British Columbia Coast Steamship Service to take the place of the "Princess Beatrice" on the Prince Rupert, Skagway or west coast of Vancouver Island has been awarded to the Canadian Pacific Railway Company. The new steamer will be 150 feet long by 48 feet broad and will have a service speed of 15 knots with accommodation for 170 first-class passengers.

According to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics the average production of wheat over the five years 1923-26 in Manitoba was 17.5 bushels to the acre, in Saskatchewan 17.3 bushels to the acre and in Alberta 17.2 bushels to the acre. The average yield per bushel in the same period were respectively \$1.60, \$1.50 and \$1.40, making the respective values per bushel from wheat for the three provinces \$17.50, \$16.74 and \$14.14.

Commenting on the use of the barometer-thermometer or "combini" in Saskatchewan, the International Harvester Co. states that during 1924 and 1925 representative consultants in general use of this machine for harvesting grain crops in Western Canada was thoroughly practical. There was a greatly increased sale due to the showing, and results even under the most adverse conditions prevailing that season were strikingly successful.

Over 600 new families arriving in Canada this year with limited capital can be induced by settled advantageously in Alberta by the various provincial agents of the Canadian Colonization Commission according to reports submitted by various representatives at the annual Alberta convention held in Calgary. The objective first set was 400 families, but a survey showed that at least 100 more immigrants could be made. T. O. P. Herzer, manager of the association, reported that during the past year 128 families had been settled in Alberta on 122,000 acres of land, of which 128 were settled last year.

Boy Globe Circler Crosses Dominion

Travelling light with little more than a toothbrush and a pair of pyjamas, young Palle Huld, fifteen-year-old Danish globe circler, passed through Montreal over Canadian Pacific lines, on Monday, March 12, having crossed the Atlantic from Greenock, Scotland, on the Canadian Pacific liner "S.S. 'Montcalm'".

On the centenary of Jules Verne's birth, a leading Danish newspaper, the "Politiken", conceived the original idea of sending a representative around the world on the regular travelling schedule of 46 days, so as to make apparent the differences of travel of 1873 and 1928. To that end a new Phineas Fogg was required, and the editor of the newspaper decided that it should be a boy of between 15 and 18 years of age. A full page advertisement was placed in local papers, and young Huld was chosen. The idea was hit upon. They must draw lots. A hat was placed on the back of a chair, the lots thrown into it, they put down their hands—Palle Huld looked at the fascinating word, "Going!" He was the lucky one.

Who is he, then? A plucky young fellow with a boyish, dark blue flash in his eyes, red facinating hair, blond as a Northern Viking and yet a slim schoolboy, 15 years old. He is not a bit afraid. He got permission from his manager to leave the business, where he is an apprentice, for two months, and after the lucky result, rushed to his mother: "Mother, do you know, I am to go round the world!"

He left Copenhagen on Thursday, the first of March, and he expected to be back, as he has promised, in 46 days.

Palle Huld sailed from Greenock, Scotland, on March 3, on the "Canadian Pacific liner S.S. 'Montcalm'". He reached Montreal on Monday morning, March 12th, and left that evening for Vancouver, where he sailed for Yokohama on board the C. P. R. flagship the "Empress of Canada". Arrangements for his further trip to Korea, China, Soviet Russia and back to Copenhagen are in the hands of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

Business Summary

The Bank of Montreal Business Summary for Ontario under date of Mar. 25th is as follows:—

Wholesale merchants report an improving tendency, with the volume of sales substantially in advance of last year. Retail trade in the larger centres shows steady demand but noticeably slower business quiet. Industry in general is on a satisfactory basis. Steel mills are running close to capacity. Production of motor cars is 25 per cent in advance of last year and automobile necessary manufacturers report a large volume of orders. The tire trade has been unusually good for this season. There has been a recent slowing down in the furniture trade. Flour mills are well employed to meet domestic demand. The boot and shoe industry shows improvement and prices are advancing. Pulp and paper mills, electrical equipment and hardware manufacturers are busy. Industries are working on full time basis. Generally speaking, Fall wheat and clover have wintered well, but freezing and thawing have caused damage in some sections.
