Tenders

FOR FIRE ALARM SYSTEM

The Corporation of Georgetown are asking for Tenders for installing an Automatic Fire Alarm System on the following premises:

1. An electric siren to be installed on the top of the Town Hall which can be heard, under normal weather conditions, anywhere in the Corporation limits and to be sounded direct from the alarm boxes.
2. Eight alarm boxes to be installed, of the type that will register the number of the box pulled, on the indicator at the Hall, and to be placed at the following places:
 - a. The Town Hall.
 - b. Corner of Main and Mill Streets.
 - c. Opposite the High School.
 - d. At the White Bridge on Main St.
 - e. At the Bowling Green at the corner of Main and Mill Streets.
 - f. At Ben Forster's Store.
 - g. At the Post at the Public School.
3. Two repeating alarm bells, one installed in the fire chief's residence and one in the truck driver's house.
4. Recording device in the Fire Hall showing from which box the alarm has been pulled.
5. The whole system to be so wired that any break in the line operates the siren and alarm bells.
6. There is to be a duplex storage battery and charger situated at the Town Hall so that the alarm system will operate independently of the Hydro system.
7. The stringing of the wires to be under the Hydro supervision and the wiring to be No. 10 double braided, weather proof, hard drawn wire.

Sealed tenders will be received up to 7 p.m., April 18th by J. B. Mackenzie, Chairman, Committee, Georgetown.

Town Council

Nelson Tuck Elected Fire Chief, Wm. Long, Deputy Chief

Council met on Tuesday evening with Mayor Dale in the chair, Hevear, Near and Counsellors Kelly, MacKenzie, Parr, MacLaren, Heavey and Cleave present.

Representative of Dominion Rubber Co. addressed Council on the fire hose. Mr. Bowman of Guelph addressed Council on new map of Town. Mr. C. B. Dayfoot addressed Council on the condition of roadway on the southern end of Market St. Mr. W. T. Evans also addressed Council on the condition of Market St. Mr. Gregory exhibited plan of new theatre he intends building and asked for a fixed assessment on building.

Communications were read from Angus and from the resignation of Nelson Tuck as Chief and Wm. Long, Deputy Chief of the Fire Brigade from Thos. Rykes to resign from duty. Mr. H. H. Hains making offer for town land.

On motion the resignation of Angus Duncan was accepted and Nelson Tuck was appointed Fire Chief and Wm. Long, Deputy Chief, at \$75 and \$45 per year respectively. Ward was appointed first truck driver at a salary of \$50 per year. The fire insurance on the town hall and fire equipment was discussed and adjusted.

The rent on the Hydro Office and store room was raised from \$160 to \$200 per year.

The tender of H. R. Minna for \$5800 Town of Georgetown delinquencies, 5 per cent. 30 days was accepted.

A number of accounts were passed.

Council adjourned to meet Monday night at 8 p.m., April 7th.

After a short illness William Snyder, an old and respected resident of Georgetown, passed away at Guelph General Hospital on Thursday last, Mar. 29th. 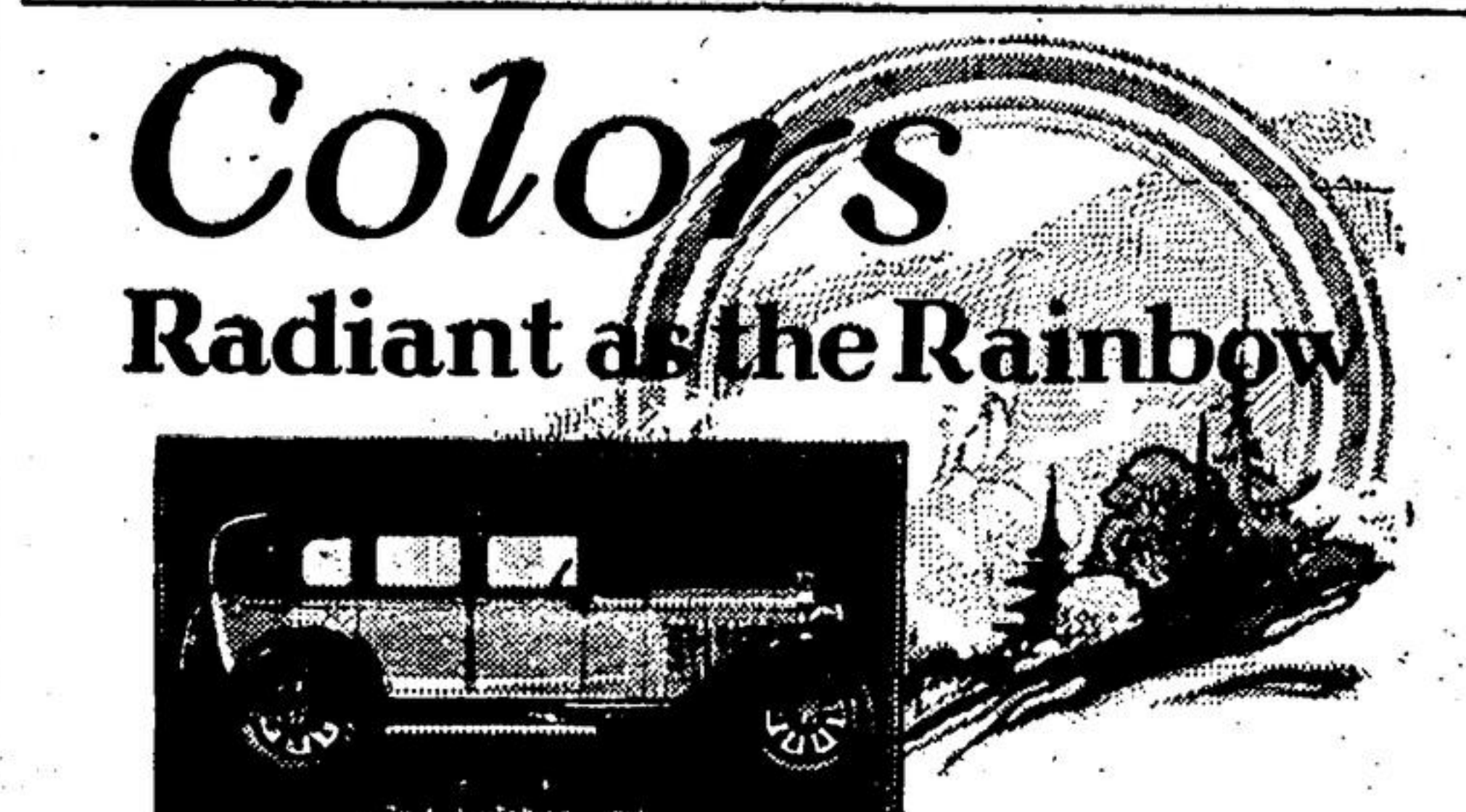
