Y.M.C.A. Camp Site on Credit at Norval

A beautiful property of some 40 acres, part of which is under woods and ravines, and lying at Norval, about 30 miles west of Toronto, has been placed at the disposal of the West End Y.M.C.A. for summer camp purposes, through the generosity of Messrs. Stollens, President of the William Neilson Company. Amusement to this effect was made yesterday by Allan McPherson, Chairman of the Boys' Work Committee of the branch, at a dinner and lecture meeting held at the Ontario Club.

The property is on the main highway to Georgetown, and is passed by the C.N.R. electric line from Toronto to Guelph. Just opposite it is the large tract held by Upper Canada College. It is the old Noble homestead, and was chosen after the committee interested in camp work had looked over many spots around Toronto. The site is on the west bank of the Credit River, and represents an investment of about \$10,000.

Drivers and Hog Grading

In a recent trial before a London Magistrate a Western Ontario driver was found guilty of neglecting to grade or mark the hogs brought from farmsteads for the new hog grading regulations. These regulations came into force some three months ago, but the Department has until this time not sought convictions against drivers who refused to follow them, it being held that the drivers would re-arrange their business methods to conform with the new procedure. A great majority of drivers have adopted the methods called for by regulations.

Hog tests were first graded at the country points and a manifest forwarded with the shipment, or each lot of hogs has been marked with distinctive signs before shipment. But some drivers have neglected to adopt these new methods, which constitute another forward step in the betterment of our hog industry, and the department found only through court convictions could these men be brought into line. This conviction at London assumes the form of what may be termed a test case, and supplies evidence that enforcement of the regulations is within the power of the department.

The idea embodied in these regulations is simply to give the producer information as to the grade and quality of his hogs and the driver's return is necessary to the department which has undertaken to supply this important information to the farmer.
