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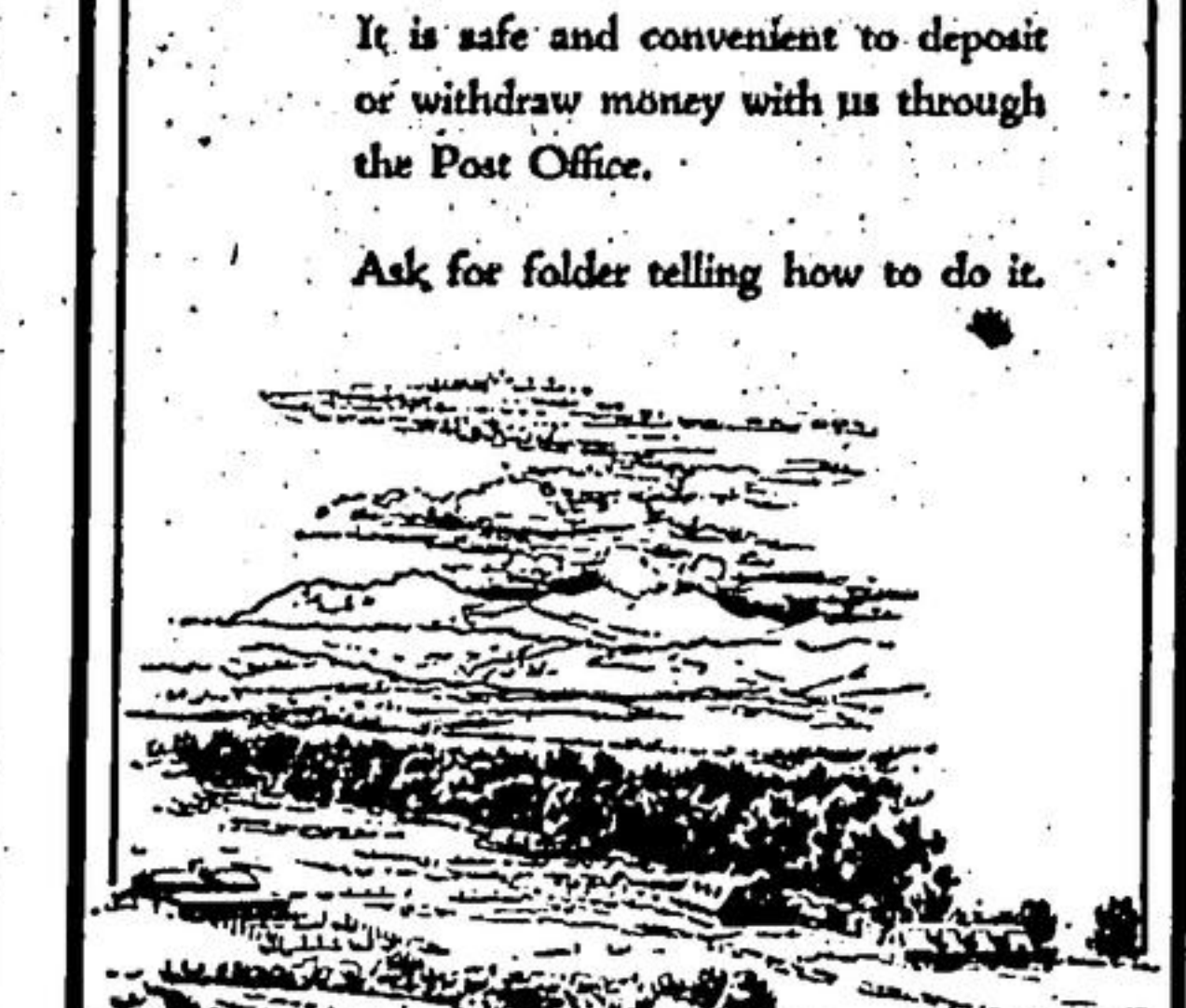

Fourth but we do not make right to do so as we are First simulated thereby by the British example, we are beginning to pay more attention to the recognition of our birthday anniversary, and it is one thing at least in which we can emulate Uncle Sam. We may not have so much to celebrate by way of achievement, nevertheless we are doing very well, thank you, for a young country.

We can cheerfully accept the fact of having a day of July 1st, and the full day of it, with our "Empire of the North" did. The rule of a possessing George as have "white man's burden" because they first of all revolted, yet we have it and are none the lower in status because we still remain within the Empire, a self-governing unit of the greatest commonwealth of free nations the world has ever known.

Another just cause for celebration is that we are now able to realize that, potentially, Canada is one of the richest countries in the world. Now, we know that we are a nation, that in the councils of nations we have our recognized place, and that, while the sea that binds us to the Motherland are firmer knit than ever, we have the fullest measure of self-determination and the largest liberty to shape our own destiny. That we have chosen to live our life in unity with the Motherland, which we sprang in evidence—our Mother's worthiness and our deep, abiding love for her.
