Sawyer (Acton) from the acts of the Apostles giving the authority for confirmation, and then the Bishop gave a very beautiful and helpful address on the "white flag." He told the candidates to be true to the flag of their church, to be loyal to the flag of their country, and to enrol themselves, dedicate themselves under the flag of the Lord-Jesus Christ. Just as he had dedicated and set apart the three flags of the Girl Guides, Wolf Cubs and Boy Scouts, so they too were to dedicate and set apart their lives for the Master and His Service.

Prayers and Invocation followed, and then took place the actual laying on of the Bishop's hands. After further prayers for guidance and help the Bishop pronounced the Benediction and thus brought a beautiful service to a close.

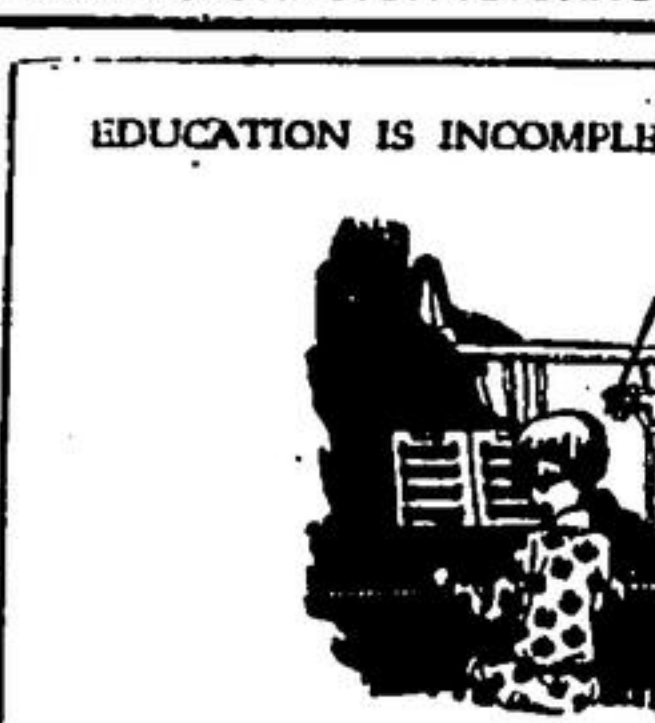
