> Ottawa, Ontario.—By the end of the season 15 flying clubs will have been established throughout Canada, according to advices from the Air Board. A total of \$170,000 is being spent by the board this year in the promotion of these clubs for civilian flying. Clubs have already been established at Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa, Hamilton, Hallfax, Saskatoon, Regins, Moose Jaw, Edmonton, Victoria and Granby. One at Halifax and another at London are about to enter the list.
