Bakers Must Protect Public
The wrapping of all bread sold in
Ontario will be compelled by the
Department of Health, under Hon.
Dr. Forbes Goffey, just as soon as
a suitable paper for such purposes
can be devised by the department.
This time it is understood, is not
far distant. Officials of the Trent
Institute of the Ontario Agricultural
College at Guelph have been experi-
menting for some time on this mat-
ter, and have just about produced a
wrapping that will meet all sanitary
requirements, and at the same time
effect no change in the taste of the
bread, neither in, or render it less
nutritious.

Mountain Resort Acquires New Charms

County Council
The Halton County Council met in
Milton on Wednesday of last week
and there was quite a lengthy and in-
teresting session.

Of special interest to Oakville was
the agreement that county money
should be spent on the sixth line from
the Station road to the town cen-
ter and on Kerr street north of
Bellevue street. Any money spent
on these streets will earn government
grant of fifty per cent.

It was agreed by council that next
year the good roads committee should
consist of three members of county
council appointed at first meeting.
Now there are five members.

The appeal by Trafalgar against
the equalization of assessment was
withdrawn for this year after Reeve
Morden had explained that what he
had in mind was an equalization by
a committee of three independent
men. Where such an assessment is
made it stands for five years. This
action will probably follow early next
year and it is hoped some permanent
agreement may be reached.

County Council
On Saturday night last one of the
Arrow buses coming from Toronto
ran off the highway opposite Mr. H.
N. Brown's farm, and into the ditch.
It was Sunday afternoon before it
was brought back to the roadway
again. Only five passengers were
on the bus at the time and no one
was injured beyond a bad shaking
up. A Ford truck also ran into the
ditch near the seventh line corner
on Monday, but was hauled out by
passing motorists. It is also said
that a local motorist, in a speed con-
test on the highway west of Acton,
took the ditch at 65 miles an hour to
avoid hitting his contestant when
the brakes were suddenly applied,
and he came out again right side up.
