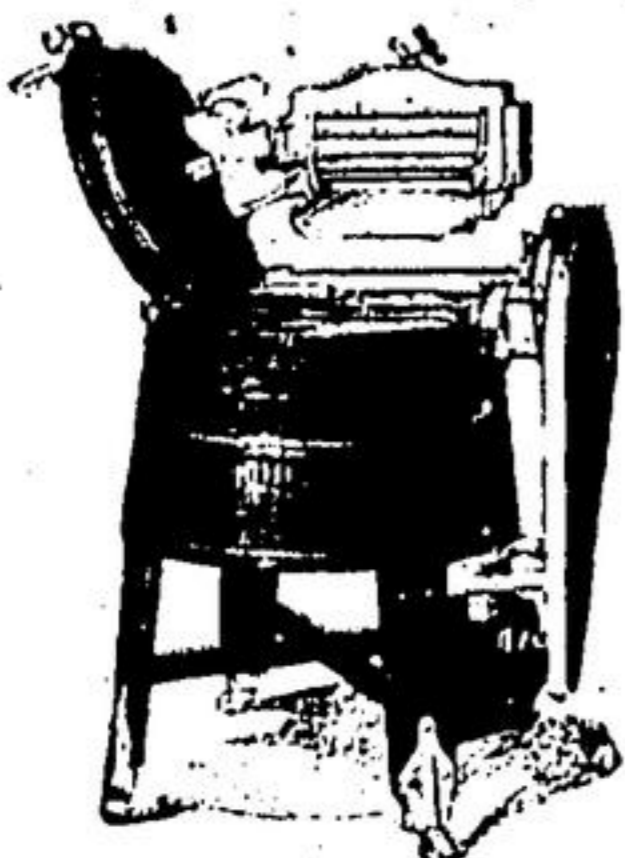

Engineers from Ottawa, however, inspected the property last week, and it will be altered at an early date, it is said, as the Government intends to provide a home there for all old soldiers who are dependent on municipalities or Provincial Governments.

What might have resulted in an other level crossing fatality was narrowly averted on the C.P.R. level crossing at Brampton, west of the Peace Foundry at 9:50 Monday morning when James Selley, returned soldier, driver for the Brampton Bakery was struck by the T-wagon train. Mr. Selley was making his rounds and believing the crossing clear on account of a freight train on the siding passed over the trucks with the wagon when he was struck by the train. The horse, wagon and himself being carried some distance. The horse was killed outright and the wagon smashed. Mr. Selley received severe head injuries and was removed to his home where he received treatment. Fortunately for him the train was not moving great speed as it was an up-grade.

General News

The first conviction and sentence under the new Securities Fraud Prevention Act has been reported from Kitchener to A. W. Rogers, Legal Secretary to the Attorney-General's Department. W. S. Peterson, who was engaged with brokerage firms and then did a brokerage business on his own account, has been fined \$1,000 and sentenced to two years in jail for his offence.
A new outbreak of rabies in the Berlin circles was uncovered today, when a dog owned by a Riverdale farmer was found to be suffering from the disease. Dr. A. E. Bowman of the Board of Health and Dr. M. B. Perdue local representative of the Dominion Health of Animals Branch said they found that the animal had bitten three persons. The dog will be quarantined for 30 days; and the injured persons will receive Pasteur treatment.

Preparatory to the operation of a new gate the wretched 350 ton gate at Lock six of the St. Lawrence canal at Thorold when lifted in the canal tragedy of August 1 is being taken apart. The gate also has been practically dismantled as it was badly out by its falling mate. Eight only of those who were injured are still in the hospital and all are well on the road to recovery.

Drowning took a toll of seven lives in Quebec and district recently. Three were drowned in the Montmorency River, two at Les Saules, near Lormes, and one at St. Anne de Beauport.

The first influx of British miners bound for the harvest fields of western Canada will reach Canadian ports by the end of this week according to advices reaching the offices of the Canadian National Railway.

That Toronto is the mecca of motor tourists from the United States was evident in the fact that a Yugoslav, Ontario Street, Milton, was crowded bearing the license plates of 22 different states. The plates most frequently seen were those from New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Michigan.

Announcement of a \$1,000 from John Matthews, New Toronto laborer, Richard Wilkinson, 29, former New Toronto laborer, was arrested in Detroit last night and turned over to Detective Sergeant August MacNeil of Windsor.

Not only will the new United States \$1 bills be smaller than the old ones, but there will also be a decrease in the size of the \$10,000 bills. We thought you'd like to know.

The five annual organ which is to be installed at the Royal York Hotel under construction by the C.P.R., will be the only one of its kind in Canada, and the greatest organ in the British Empire. It is being built by Casavant Freres, of St. Hyacinthe, Quebec, and will weigh approximately four box cars. Over 100 miles of copper wire will be used in the mechanism.

Deceased is survived by his wife, but the deceased had been in ill-health, but their deaths were quite unexpected.

The bride was dressed in blue, trimmed with cream, lace hat and shoes to match and wearing a corsage bouquet of pink roses and lily of the valley. After luncheon was served the young couple left amid the usual showers of confetti, rice, peanuts, etc. for a motor trip through Quebec, Nova Scotia, P. E. Island and United States, returning September 1st when Mr. Anderson will resume his duties at Humberston School. They will reside at 520 Riverdale Ave., Toronto.

Here and There

The Maritime Livestock Market was organized in March, 1927, to market Maritime livestock—chiefly hogs, lambs and some cattle—for 7,000 members of over sixty clubs in the three Maritime Provinces. The report of the first year shows \$2,524,177 received for 20,417 lambs, 19,518 hogs, 20 calves and 414 cattle.

An extension to the air express services maintained by the Canadian Pacific Express Company has been announced, and a new air line will be opened early in September between New York, via Albany, and Montreal. Lines are already operating between Rimouski, Montreal, Toronto, and Ottawa.

A name of unusual distinction will be added to the Canadian Pacific's Royal Family of ocean ships when the fourth 8,000 ton vessel of the new "Duchess" class is launched in Scotland. She will be named the "Duchess of York" and will be christened by Her Royal Highness the Duchess of York herself. The ship's name being recently taken from the "Duchess of Cornwall."

Port William, Ontario.—Three grain elevator corporations with large interests at the Head of the Lakes are involved in a merger of several powerful Canadian terminal and elevator companies, the new company being known as the "Consolidated Grain Company." A total of 12,000,000 bushels of elevator capacity will be owned and operated by the new company.

Betty and Buster Brull, two little black bear cubs, have sailed from Montreal for Italy where they will be presented to the Marquis de Bracco, the famous Italian hunter of the world. They are lovely babies, scarcely larger than a child's toy teddy bear, and of an amiable disposition. They were obtained by Mr. E. Romerall of Montreal, through the General Tourist Department of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and are similar to the little bears sent over by him a few years ago to Missolati.

The Dominion Government is going to pay attention to the birds with the object of training these birds for purposes of communication. The Department of National Defence is to have charge of the work. The Civil Service Commission has announced an open competitive examination for a pigeon loft manager in connection with the civil Government's operations of the Department of National Defence, to organize and administer a pigeon communication service.
