Instead-it takes about six bottles for every quart delivered in Georgetown. Milk bottles are just loaned-they are never sold. Each one costs us 10c, delivered. They always remain the legal property of the milk distributor. It is actually against the law to refill them for

We lose so many bottles each year that this percentage of loss will have have to be figured into the cost of the milk in the future if we hope to stay in business, so we are making this plea to our customers to return EVERY EMPTY MILK BOTTLE in the house that can be found so that we can sell milk at the lowest possible cost.
