"Persons, Not Things, Are Banger-

From time to time, we may read in the press, or hear someone express surprise that a second case of some communicable disease has occurred in a private home, school or institu tion, in spite of the fact that disinfection and fumigation of the place

has been carried out. Such surprise is evidence of a faith in a procedure concerning Cosmetics were privately applied which modern knowledge has taught us the mistake.

Communicable diseases are spread by discharges from the body, which carry disease germs, and this spread practically always occurs in a direct manner. It is the fresh, moist droplets from the nose and mouse that is the saliva left on the common drinking-oup that is a menace to the next user. It is the warm, moist hands, soiled with body excretions, that carry disease germs to the mouth, either directly or by soiling

food that is going into the mouth. Disease germs die comparatively quickly outside the human body. The person carrying these disease germs must be discovered and isolated if the spread is to be stopped. In schools and institutions, this means a medical and nursing service

organized for this purpose. Washing of furniture and fumigation of rooms is not the correct way to fight the communicable diseases. The correct way is to find the source (some human being) and then to
