### Lord Lovat of Naval

"I am very pleased to be here with you," Lord Lovat told the people who gathered at the Boy's Hostel on Thursday afternoon, Aug. 23rd, to welcome him, and let him see just what the United Church is doing to train starting young British lads off in their new life in Canada; "but I am especially pleased to hear the good news about the lads from South Wales and that they are getting on so well."  
"But I understand that is true of all the boys who have come over, and we must not glorify one nation at the cost of another. It is a great satisfaction to think that with their appreciation of hard work, these boys will make good citizens. Welshmen are excellent workmen at all times, whether above or below ground."  
"The letters I have read show that the boys in a large majority are making good already after live or six weeks. Their letters show that they receive the greatest kindness from the Canadian farmers, one young lad saying: "I have the best box I could be with."  
Humorously, Lord Lovat referred to the frequent use of the word "guess" in the letters as an indication of the way they are settling down to Canadian ways. Great praise was given the United Church for the work being done and for the fine organization with which the work is being handled.  
Reminding the committee that fire escapes would be an advantage on the building, his Lordship left a generous contribution to the Hostel that will aid in securing this desirable protection.

### Active Fall Trade Uniformly Expected

Despatches to Dun's Review from branch offices of R. G. Dun & Company, located in the principal cities, continue to report generally favorably business conditions throughout the greater part of the Dominion of Canada, and almost all particularly stress the uniformity with which an active fall and winter trade is anticipated. The retail demand for warm weather specialties is now very light, but goods of this description have been well absorbed, and, in numerous instances, sales have exceeded expectations. On the other hand, the movement of early fall merchandise is steadily increasing with the ending of vacations and the marketing of the crops, and merchants in most sections regard prospects as being more encouraging than at this time for several years.

### Well-Known Singer Dead

The Canadian musical world suffered a marked loss in the death on Sunday afternoon following a brief illness of Arthur Hight, one of the most well known baritone singers in Canada. Death followed an attack of appendicitis.  
At the time of his death he was solicitor at First Church, Christ Scientist. Other churches which knew him were Old St. Andrew's and Trinity United, where his services were much sought after.  
In recent years he sang over the radio from number of stations.  
In connection with the musical world was not purely that of a performer. His love for his profession spread in another direction, and he was a teacher at the Toronto Conservatory of Music for a number of years. Until last year he was a musical director of the Ladies' College at Whitby.  
Mr. Hight is survived by his wife, formerly Mrs. Lillian Whyte, and a daughter, Kathleen. He was born in the United States, but came to Canada with his parents at an early age and spent most of his boyhood at Ontario.  
Deceased was a son-in-law of our esteemed townsman Mr. Wm. Whyte of Maple Ave. and was well known in Georgetown.
