He found what he wanted just a few miles from Georgetown, a 10-month-old Shorthorn bull "Rochee Mayflower," bred on the farm of Duncan Campbell and Son, at Moffat. The deal was closed and Buchanan paid the handsome price of \$3,000 for the animal, which he is shipping to the Antipodes.
