**LARGE CONCURRENCE**  
The Inspiring Sermon by Rev. Geo. A. Little, B.A.

Anniversary services were held in the United Church last Sunday when large congregations in Glen and Norval were present. The services were presided over by Rev. Geo. A. Little, B.A., of Toronto.

Rev. Dr. Dickie the pastor was present and assisted at the services. Rev. Mr. Pyley of the Baptist Church was also present. The morning service and read the scripture lesson from the 5th Chapter of Paul's epistle to the Colossians.

Rev. Mr. Little chose as his text the 10th verse of the 2nd chapter of Colossians. He was eloquent in his message which is the ideal of all principality and power. He said in part:

Paul was teaching the Colossians and knew what Christ could do for them when he said "We are complete in Him." He was pointing to the life of Christ as a well-balanced life and he was interested in all people. He was not interested in the knowledge of how complete he was. He was interested in the ideal of human character and in the life of the soul. The Christian experience is a satisfying religion and Christ came that all might have life. He cannot overcome ourselves and put evil out of our hearts by main force, but let Christ live in us and evil will vanish. Love, truth, beauty and goodness will crowd out of our lives. We must lose the desire for self. Paul pressed on toward the goal and so we must put effort into our lives and grow in Christ. Let us be thankful for a beautiful harvest for His glory and His own. God's goodness to us through Christ. If we are trying to honor, seeking His glory, we shall find it. He is allowing His spirit to enter into our lives we can be sure we are in Him. Let us enter into His life and the experience of those who are living in Christ.

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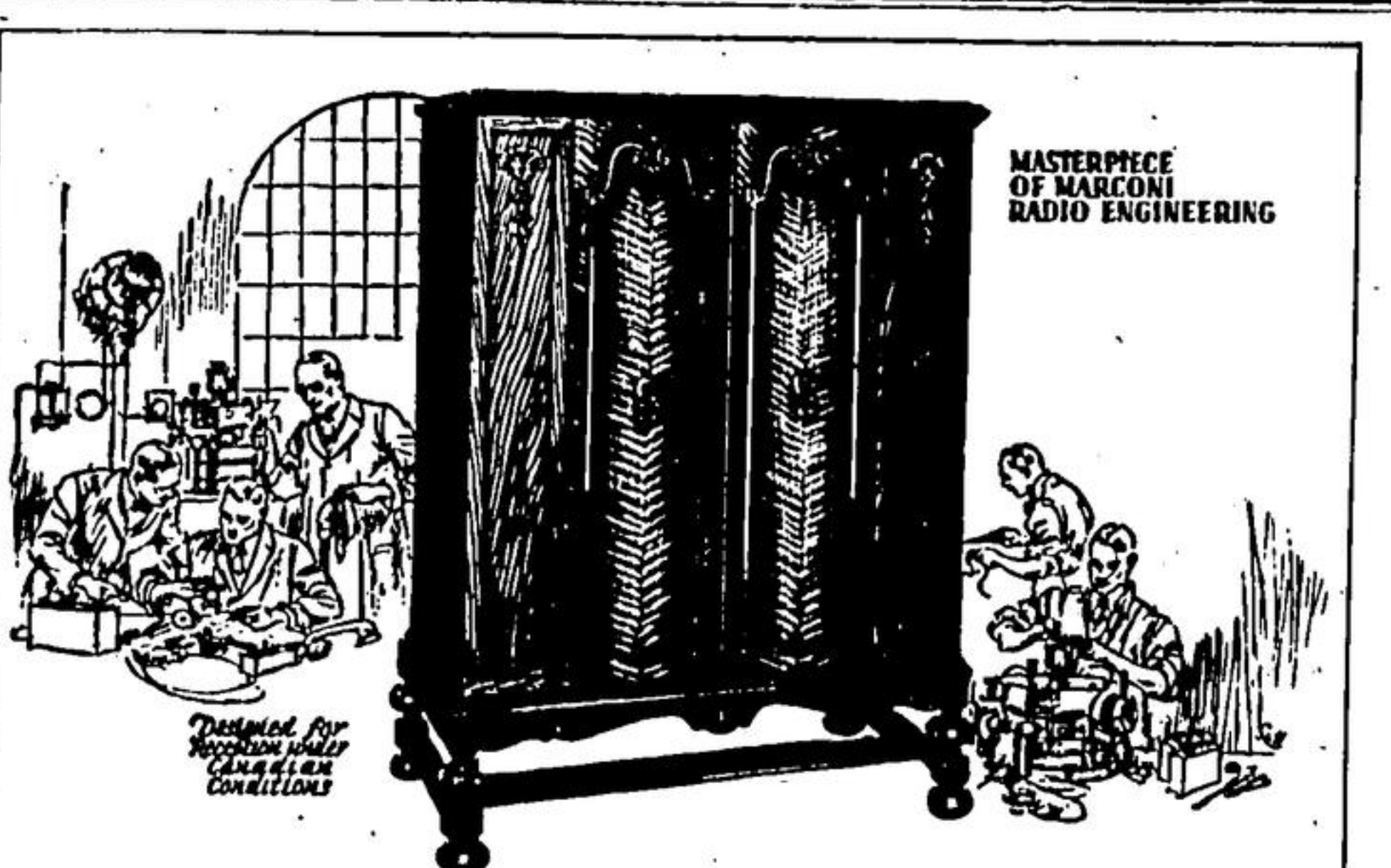
