The arteries are normally elastic. Control of blood pressure is exercised. First of all, by the heart, or pump, through the force and frequency of its beat; and, secondly, by the arteries, through their expansion or contraction, which abilities they possess as a result of their elasticity. Some of the arteries are very large, such as those in the abdomen, and if they relax, they are capable of holding all the blood in the body. Bometimes they do this. with the result that the person faints because all the blood is drained away


