KNOX CHURCH ANNIVERSARY
LARGE CONGREGATIONS LISTEN TO SPLENDID SERMONS BY REV. H. K. ABRAHAM, B.A.

Another mile stone in the history of Knox Presbyterian Church, Georgetown, was passed on Sunday last when a large gathering of worshippers attended the anniversary services held in the beautiful church edifice.

Rev. H. K. Abraham, B.A., of Toronto was the preacher for the day and his splendid sermons were much appreciated and enjoyed.

In the morning after reading the 103 Psalm, Mr. Abraham chose as his text the 2nd verse of the 50th chapter of John: "And when he had said this, he breathed on them, and said unto them, Receive ye the Holy Ghost."

He said in part: "The disciples deeply regretted Christ's leaving them and were filled with fear but Jesus said unto them, I will send you a comforter, meaning a protector and helper. How largely are we dependent upon the 'Divine gift' for our peace and the 'Divine gift' is due to God's gift. He supplies man's many wants and guides the ways of his life. His hand could be seen in the great war and he is working in the lives of men today. We are moved toward God by some invisible power. God's way is a mysterious way and there are many things in life we cannot understand. Life itself is a mystery and why should we be surprised at the mind of God when we do not understand the human mind. The GIFT of God's holy spirit to man means power and protection. This dispels fear for their weakness in a great world but Jesus promised to send a helper to guide them, a comforter who would abide with them forever. Jesus fulfilled His promise and power and guidance came to the disciples. Here is a message for us. It is not knowledge we need for we have been under the influence of the church all our lives and the power we need to master life's secret, power to live and do His will, to glorify His name. God has promised to make us able for our task and He will give His holy spirit to those who ask, but we must repent of our sins of all kinds and ask Him to bestow His gift. In the evening Rev. Mr. Abraham preached another splendid sermon choosing as his text the 31st verse of the 32nd chapter of Genesis in the 30th verse of the 13th chapter of John.

The special music by the choir under the able leadership of Mr. A. B. Cleave was of a high order and well rendered. The soloists were Miss Mrs. Madden and Mr. Le Brun of Toronto were very much enjoyed and appreciated, as was the organ voluntaries by Miss May McAllister, church organist.

The choir was also assisted at both services by Miss Madden, Miss Clark, Miss McLeod and Mr. Le Brun of Toronto.

Beautiful bouquets of chrysanthemums adorned the pulpit and choir rail.
