RAZED BY FIRE

OLD LANDMARK RAZED BY FIRE
GENERAL STORE AT HORNEY WAS
COMPLETELY DESTROYED BY
FIRE ON SUNDAY

Fire of unknown origin breaking out
in the old General Store afternoon
completely destroyed the general store
and contents, the post-office and the
living quarters of the proprietor, Harry
Robertson, who had been in business
at Georgetown on the 7th line for
a large warehouse, formerly the temp-
erance hall, and horse sheds adjoining
the store.

The building was an ancient land-
mark, at one time David Lindsay's hotel
and a popular stopping place for
those who travel in Ontario, etc. On
the main street.

Georgetown, Milton and Oakville
fire brigades with their trucks respond-
ed to the call for help, but were unable
to extinguish the flames.

The Georgetown trucks became
stuck in the snow on the way, but the
Milton brigade's new electric pump did
good work and soon the fire was under
control.

Mr. Robertson, who was in the

store at the time, telephoned to his brother,
Stuart, who noticed it from
his home in the great work in
the country, town and city. The situation
is hopeful. The people of Ontario are
awakening to the need of earnestly
contending for the abolition of alcohol
as a beverage.

The loss is estimated at \$18,000,
which is partially covered by insurance
and the balance is to be paid out
