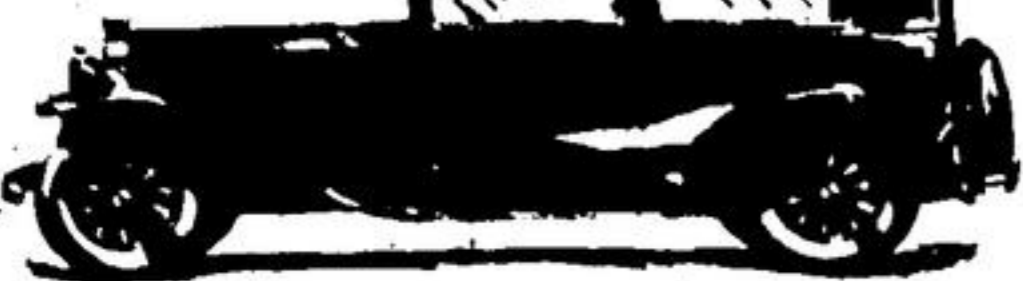

He stated that a campaign of moral suasion is urgently needed. Rev. Dr. Bruce spoke of the prohibition movement and the law and force and institutions are theoretically opposed to the use of alcohol as a beverage. He said we have a triumphant tide of shameless drinking and crime. Evidently the revulsion and the users are motivated by the love of gain and the desire to escape the responsibilities of life in sobriety.

Dr. Bruce, in a humorous but intensely earnest address dealt with the taking of the "New Year's Resolution Movement." For one hundred years prohibition has been making its way in the world. He said that the need of the hour is a wide spread organization. The Sons of Temperance have done heroic service in the past, but the time has come when we must awaken to the need of earnestly contending for the abolition of alcohol as a beverage.

Close Burlington Customs Outpost.

A memorandum was received by Robert Colvin, collector of national revenue, customs excise divisions of Hamilton, from E. W. Broadner, commissioner of customs, department of national revenue, Ottawa, to the effect that the outpost of Burlington, Ont., under the survey of the post of Hamilton, would be closed on and after March 1st next. This action no doubt was the result of the recommendation of the royal commission on customs inquiry held a few years ago, which favored the closing of several post-outposts and preventive stations in different parts of Canada. At the present time all entries tendered at Burlington are sent to Hamilton weekly, re-checked here and forwarded to the department at Ottawa under Hamilton numbers. The closing of the outpost reduces the number of entries under the local jurisdiction to five, these being Dundas, Dunnville, Grimsey, Oakville and Port Maitland.
