Touching on the topic of agriculture Premier Ferguson was free to admit that the industry was not going ahead so fast as it should. At the same time he had no sympathy for those that were always shouting "blue ruin".

Hydro engineers have reported that it is estimated that Hydro will reach every home in Ontario, where it is economically feasible, within the next seven years.

Progressive members of the Legislature came in for severe criticism at the hands of the Hydro Minister in connection with their charges that the present government was doing little or nothing to assist the farmer in securing the benefits of hydro.

That he would recommend to the Ontario Hydro Electric Commission that assume the burden of maintenance charges on rural power lines as further aid to the farmers of Ontario

in lessening the cost of hydro, was the message conveyed to the Legislature by Hon. J. R. Cooke, Hydro Commissioner and Minister Without Portfolio, during the course of his contribution to the budget debate.

Pointing out that the maintenance charges were about one mile on rural line per year, or \$2.00 (Two Dollars) a month to the user, Mr. Cooke felt that the time had now come when the Commission could afford to relieve the rural users of their burden.

How can anyone any longer talk of hydro inefficiency when in 1924 only 154 of rural line were constructed as against 1,200 miles in 1929, stated the Minister. "At the present time the total cost of operating the installation of \$5,000 each day to carry on the work which is designed to aid the farmer."

One thousand, eight hundred and eighty-one pupils are attending the Clush Agricultural College at the present time. Hon. John S. Martin, Minister of Agriculture informed the House, of this number 77 came from outside of the Province of Ontario.
