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PROF. DUXBURY AT THE UNITED CHURCH

The United Church was full last Sunday, both services to hear Professor John Duxbury, the eminent ecumenicalist of London, England, in his rendering of Holy Scriptures. In the morning, after the opening devotions led by Rev. Dr. Dickie and the Anthem by the choir, Mr. Duxbury announced that he was going to recite the Book of Job, following the rendering of it by the choir that eminent scholar the late Professor Moulton. The characters were so clearly portrayed by gesture and intonation that the audience was gripped at the start, and the spell never relaxed until the end. Perhaps the reciter's best decision was that of Job's three friends who came to mourn with him, and yet increased the burden of his grief by accusing his afflictions to some sin committed by himself or his children. Job, however, denied that suffering is a proof of guilt and declared his steadfast faith in God.
In the evening Professor Duxbury recited passages of Scripture which he had woven together to make a complete narrative of the life of Jesus Christ while among men. Commencing with the Prophecies, the reciter gave the history of the birth of Jesus, the happenings at the time of his birth, the flight into Egypt, the return to Palestine, when the angry mob shouted "Crucify Him!" gave a Duxbury and the scope for his historic abilities, and made the bare word of the Bible appeal to living power. The story unfolded in flash and flood. The sturdy grandeur of the passages from the Book of Revelation portraying the sublime work at King's Head, while the worshipping elders, as seen by St. John, brought to the attention of the audience the fact that the Scripture itself, unaided by comment can become, through the interpretation, one of the greatest sermons.
WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY MEETING IN UNITED CHURCH
The Easter Thank-offering meeting of the Women's Missionary Society, presided over by Mrs. R. C. Adams, was very largely attended yesterday and a splendid collection was added to the fund.
Mrs. Wallace McClure, whose husband is on the medical staff of the United Church in South China, gave an intensely interesting address on the educational, evangelistic, and social work at King's Head, 80 miles from Canton, and in the province from which the Chinese have emigrated to Canada. Dr. Vincent Chung, born of Chinese parents in Victoria, educated at the Oriental College there, and at Toronto University, is in the hospital of this Mission. The aim of the Missionaries has been to spread Christianity with the Chinese, throwing responsibility for carrying on the church upon them so that they may be self-sustaining.
Interesting incidents were given of the work at King's Head, the worst features of western civilization are influencing China, and urging the necessity of Christian work.
Mrs. Black's Easter solo was much appreciated. The meeting closed with a prayer and a benediction.
Next Cracking Car
While cranking his car recently, Rev. C. W. Wolts, of Kilbride, met with a serious accident. The engine back-fired and he was thrown backwards, his head striking the wall of the garage, causing concussion of the brain. We are pleased to hear that Mr. Wolts is now doing nicely.
