**GENERAL NEWS**

Anthrop "Iky", farmer, who shot and injured chief of police Alex Halbert of Oranville, was sentenced to five years in Penitentiary.

A house owned by George A. Hemstreet, and occupied by D. D. Forrest, in Milton, was damaged to the extent of \$400 by last Friday. The loss was covered by insurance.

A colt kicking a lantern over was responsible for the burning of J. W. Coe's barn, near Stayner, causing a loss of \$2,000. Five horses, 12 registered cattle and 10 pigs were cremated.

At the regular meeting of the Women's Institute, held at the home of Mrs. S. Learmont, on 13th inst., the business included a donation to the Welsh Miners' Relief Fund.

G. P. Thompson, formerly of the town of Streetsville, who succeeded J. F. McCallum as superintendent of the Halton-Well Children's Aid Society, has taken up his residence in Milton.

Rev. Dr. Marsh, who with Mrs. Marsh (nee Cora Burling) has been spending the winter in Milton, has accepted a call to the Presbyterian Church at Norwich, in Oxford county.

A petition asking for the release of W. Nelson, who was recently sentenced to three months for being intoxicated, is being largely signed by the people who believe the sentence was too severe.

Hydro is spreading in Trafalgar. In a few days residents on the seventh line, back concession, sixth line, and ninth line, will have the "juice" on and houses and barns will be brilliantly lighted.

Lark mothers who will not get up these children for school, is the main reason given by a London trustee officer, for the number to assist the past two months at the city school.

An Ottawa man has invented a brake that will bring a car going at sixty miles an hour to a dead stop in twenty feet. He is now working on a device to keep the driver from going through the windshield.

Dundalk citizens have decided to offer the sum of \$2,000 and a free site to the man or men who will undertake to build a rink in Dundalk. The rink must be erected according to specifications set forth by an appointed committee.

Mr. W. E. Downs, formerly leader of the Brampton Band, after spending three years in Ramoth, during which time he brought the band of that town up to a high standard of efficiency, leading it to the winning prize at the Ottawa Exhibition, has accepted an offer in Guelph.

Appeal of Arvo Vaara, editor of a Finnish newspaper published in Streetsville, was dismissed in the second divisional court at Osgoode hall, Toronto recently. Vaara was convicted on February 13th of sedition, and was sentenced by Justice Wright to six months in jail and fine of \$1,000.

At the fifteenth annual meeting of the Ontario Dairy Producers' Association, held recently in Toronto, J. C. Wilson, county good roads superintendent for Halton; T. V. Anderson, of Leamington, chairman of the Ontario Dairy Producers' Association; and R. H. Fair, of the county of Frontenac, each received a presentation from the conference in token of having attended all conferences for the last 15 years.

At Brampton on Tuesday Fred Lepofsky, who operates the Streetsville Creamery, also chairman of the Ontario Dairy Producers' Association, was fined \$50 and costs by Police Magistrate Crawford.

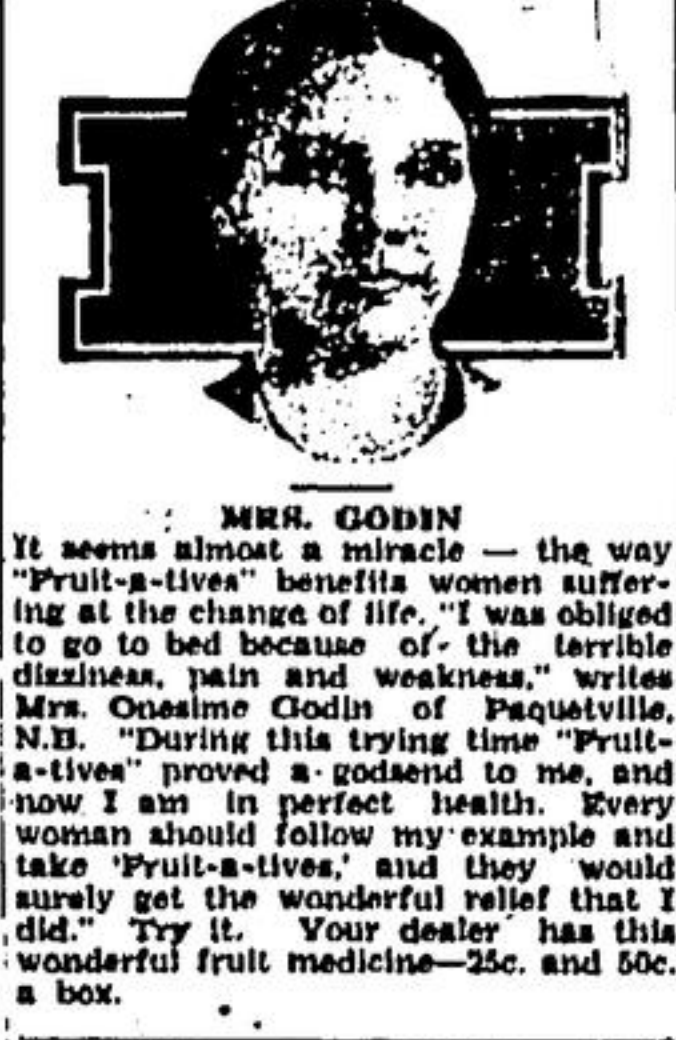

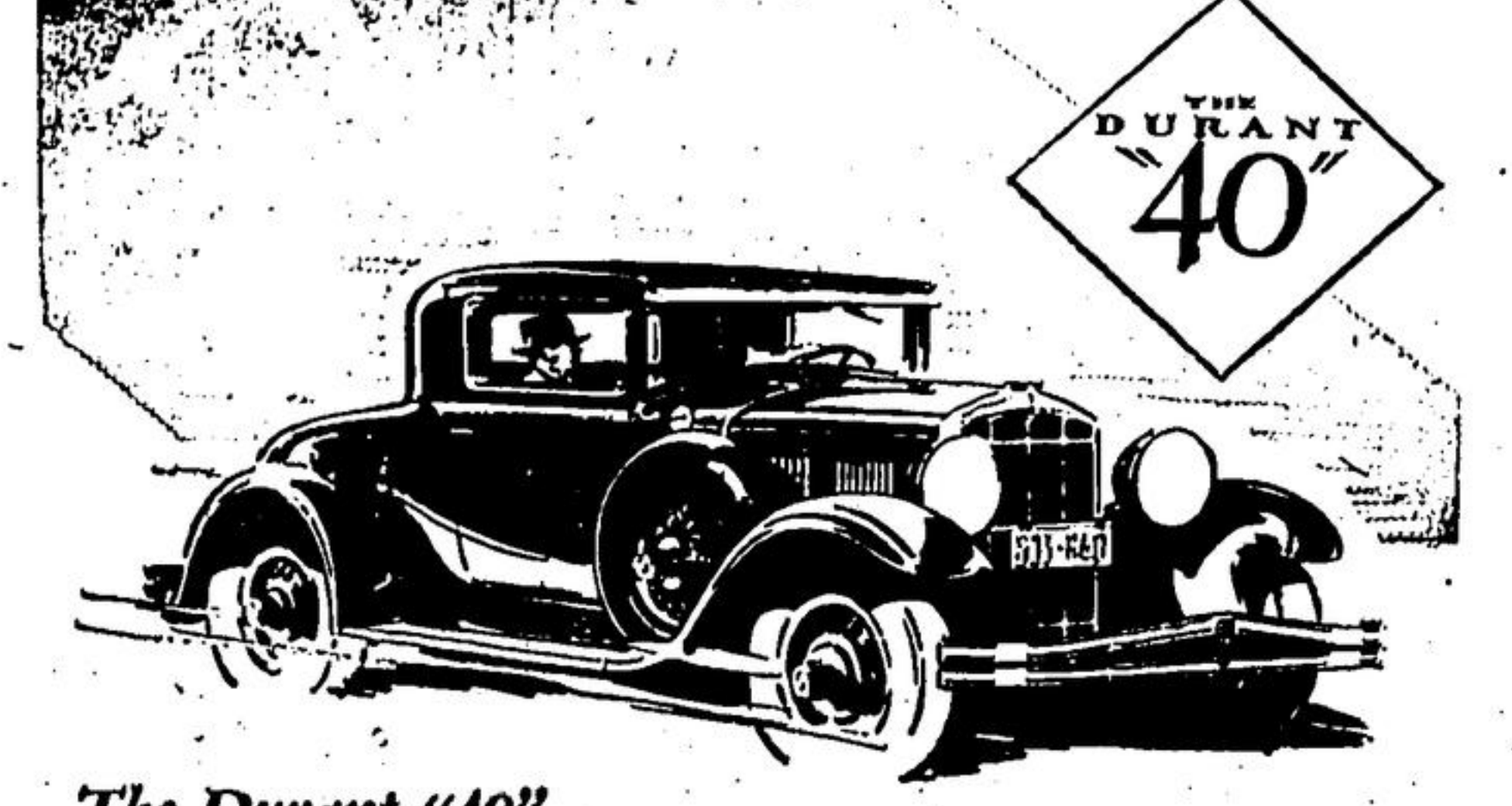
