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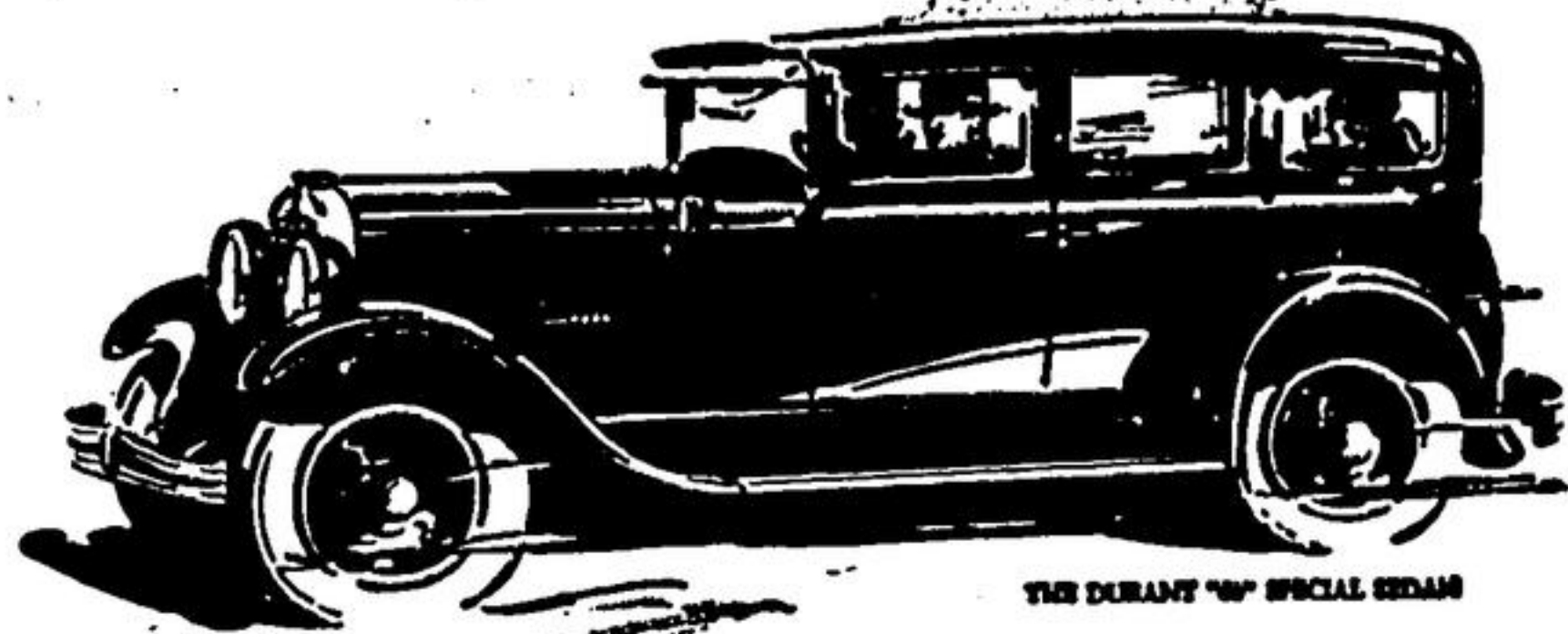

### Old Age Pensions

Since Hon. Howard Ferguson has brought down the old age pension bill in the Ontario legislature, and made it a Government measure, it will likely become law. The bill, which of necessity follows the requirements of the Dominion Act, states that the municipalities will be asked to pay 30 per cent. of all pensions. The province pays 50 per cent. and the Dominion the 20 per cent. provided by the act. All administration costs will be borne by the municipalities and the procedure which has been successfully used in carrying into effect the Mothers' Allowance Act will be followed. Some objections have been raised to the municipalities being obliged to pay at all, but it is likely that unless they did, abuses would arise in many people being put on the list of pensioners unnecessarily. Applications for pensions must be made locally, with right of appeal. The pension as provided for under the Dominion Act will be extended to all needy persons over 65 years of age, and will not be more than \$340 a year. Thus for each pension the Dominion will provide \$120 a year, the province \$72 and the municipality \$48. The Government is working on the theory that the municipalities authorities know best local conditions and are best qualified to pass on applications. In many cases the local authorities will save money on local charities.

Representation has been made that Ontario alone of all provinces was asking municipalities to contribute a portion. As a matter of fact, as Mr. Ferguson pointed out in Manitoba the whole cost of the pension is levied against the municipalities, including the cost of administration. In Alberta the municipalities pay 10 per cent. It is estimated that there are some 18,000 to 20,000 people in the province entitled to the pension. The total cost is not excessive. Of this amount the Dominion will contribute \$2,250,000, the province \$1,500,000 and the municipalities \$800,000. Spread over the whole province this is not a large amount. There is a growing feeling that the state is responsible for providing for the poor and unfortunate. It all costs money, but the public will not begrudge it for such a sake.

### DAM CARRIED AWAY CAUSES HEAVY LOSS

**ROGER BROTHERS TROUT FISHING RESERVOIR CREATED AT GREAT EXPENSE WAS DESTROYED BY FLOODS**

Perhaps the heaviest blow suffered from the recent rains and the overflow of rivers in this district was that of Roger Brothers' near Terra Cotta. They conducted a farm through which runs a small stream, emptying into the Credit near Cheltenham. Some years ago with outside interests they constructed a concrete dam, strengthening it every summer, and the stream was converted into an exclusive trout fishing rendezvous. The grounds surrounding were beautified and with the objective of making a sale to a syndicate, no expense had been spared to make it an ideal location for an exclusive club. On Sunday the swollen stream carried the dam away, after it had been undermined by a flood of the previous days. The loss to the Rogers brothers will run into thousands of dollars. It is understood that the dam was insured for a property was in the neighborhood of \$100,000.

Mrs. Hannant is survived by two sons and two daughters, Elizabeth of Toronto, Catharine and J. T. Hannant of Milton, and Wm. of Alberta.

#### MRS. JOHN BAYCHELOR

A former well-known and respected resident of Georgetown, in the person of Mrs. Mary Baychelor, widow of John Baychelor, passed away quite suddenly at her home in Toronto on Saturday, April 6th. With the recent completion of nearly five hundred elevators at country market points in Western Canada the Canadian Wheat Pool, the wheat growers' co-operative marketing organization, now owns and operates a total of 1,417 such elevators with a combined capacity of 23,500,000 bushels. In addition, the pool has twenty terminal elevators located at Fort William, Port Arthur, Vancouver, Prince Rupert, Buffalo and Winnipeg, with a total capacity of 23,000,000 bushels, or an aggregate capacity for all pool elevators of 46,500,000 bushels. The pool elevators could therefore at one time hold about one fifth of the normal wheat production of Western Canada. This impressive total of elevators has been built or acquired by the pool since its first year of operation in 1924. The membership of the pool is now about 145,000 actual farmers in Western Canada and the annual gross turnover exceeds \$200,000,000. A point of turnover the wheat pools represent the largest business in Canada except the Canadian federal government.
