The printed Auditor's Report for the Town of Georgetown is now in the hands of the Town Clerk and any taxpayer desiring a copy may have one for the asking. A perusal of the report will give some idea of the financial condition of the Town. The Finance Committee and Council are up against it. At the end of December 1928 the Corporation had an overdraft of \$22,877.66, when ratepayers were owing the said Corporation in the neighborhood of \$300,000. This means that the Corporation is called upon to pay a large amount of interest for money borrowed from the Bank because of the failure of ratepayers to meet their obligations to the Municipality. It also means that those who are paying their taxes, water rates, when due, are paying a big share of the interest on the borrowed money. The matter of uncollected monies owing the town is getting quite serious and unless remedied we may expect our tax rate to go considerably higher than it is at the present time.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS

INTERESTING AND INSTRUCTIVE ADDRESS BY JUDGE HARKNESS

There was a good attendance at the Public Library on Monday evening to hear Judge Harkness give his address on "The League of Nations." Rev. Mr. Maclean occupied the chair and introduced the speaker.

Judge Harkness said that he came to Georgetown as a representative of the League of Nations Society in Canada, a society organized for the purpose of educating the people regarding what the League stands for. He explained the origin and working of the League of Nations in its efforts to permanently put an end to war. Of the 64 nations qualified to come into the League, 55 were members at the present time while 9 still remain outside, the principal ones of the 9 being the United States and Russia. These he believed would soon join the League. He referred to the appalling loss of life and suffering of the Great War; the stupendous cost in money and the great suffering today for the upkeep of war machinery. The League of Nations is doing good work and as an example of the speaker referred to the recent settlement which was brought about in the case of Bolivia and Paraguay by the League. The League of Nations is the most powerful social service organization the world has ever known and is a world movement for the betterment of all nations and peoples. International co-operation makes for international peace and human welfare realizing the ideal of Jesus.

The objects of the League of Nations Society in Canada are: To promote international peace. To furnish information about the League of Nations, its principles, its organizations and its work; To study international problems and Canada's relation thereto as a member of the British Commonwealth and of the League of Nations; To foster mutual understanding, goodwill, and the habits of co-operation between the people of Canada and of other countries; In accordance with the spirit of the League of Nations; To promote the establishment of provincial or local associations, clubs or other bodies having like objects, and to co-operate with any existing organizations for such purposes.

The address was illustrated by a number of lantern slides. A vote of thanks was tendered Judge Harkness for his very able address, after which the singing of the National Anthem brought the meeting to a close. All those who received membership cards are asked to return same whether they wish to sign or not to Mrs. P. A. Harley or Mrs. H. W. Kennedy.

Canada Gypsum Buys Five Ontario Co.'s

R. E. Haire, president of Canada Gypsum and Alabaster Ltd., has announced the purchase by that company of five Ontario concerns, thereby consolidating Canada Gypsum and Alabaster as the leading producer in Canada.

The company has acquired, in addition to the five new units, other "properties" which are as yet unnamed. Among the concerns purchased are: Bechtel Lime and Stone Co., Bechtelville, Christie, Henderson Co. Ltd., Hespeler, D. Robertson Lime Co., Milton; Toronto Lime Co., Limalous, and the Wellington Lime Co., Toronto. The company announcement says that operation of the properties acquired will fit in economically with the current operations of Canada Gypsum and Alabaster Ltd.

Busy Season at Norval Hostel

C. M. Bowman, Chairman, and A. Maclean, Secretary of the Immigration Committee of the United Church, appearing before the Board of Home Missions, now in session at Toronto, reported plans for placing 1,000 young British immigrants on the land in Ontario during the present season. In an incomplete season last year, they had settled 181 boys from Great Britain with farmers of Central and Western Ontario, with good results.

In the past thirty days Mr. Maclean had placed 181 boys and 110 young men, all from the British Isles, with Ontario farmers. Facing its first full season of operations, Bowman said that the committee expected to handle its full quota of 800 boys and 400 young men. The full program would be carried out without any call on Church funds, in accordance with the policy laid down by the late Dr. C. E. Manning, Home Missions Secretary, in inaugurating the work.

The busy season was now on, and the hostel at Norval was being used as main distributing centre. Applications of 800 farmers for prospective fruit land, and the suitability of each for the care of a boy was being ascertained, by means of a questionnaire, in some instances. Ministers and congregations were showing a commendable interest in the young settlers to the various communities.

GRENFELL NOTES

The annual meeting of the Grenfell Association was held at the home of Mrs. H. W. Kennedy on Thursday, April 11th. A resume of the year's work showed that a fine bale of clothing, tinware and hospital supplies also arrived of preserved fruit had been sent to the Mission Nursing Station at Mutton Bay. A box of books was sent to St. Anthony's hospital and a radio to the coast and \$66.35 in cash sent forward for the support of the Grenfell Mission.

It was decided to hold the usual shower of clothing and hospital supplies on Friday, May 17th, besides a tea and sale of baking donations of money and increased membership which will be held in aid of the worthy interdenominational mission. When you are turning out the contents of your closet, please save the worn second-hand clothing for the sale to be sent in May.

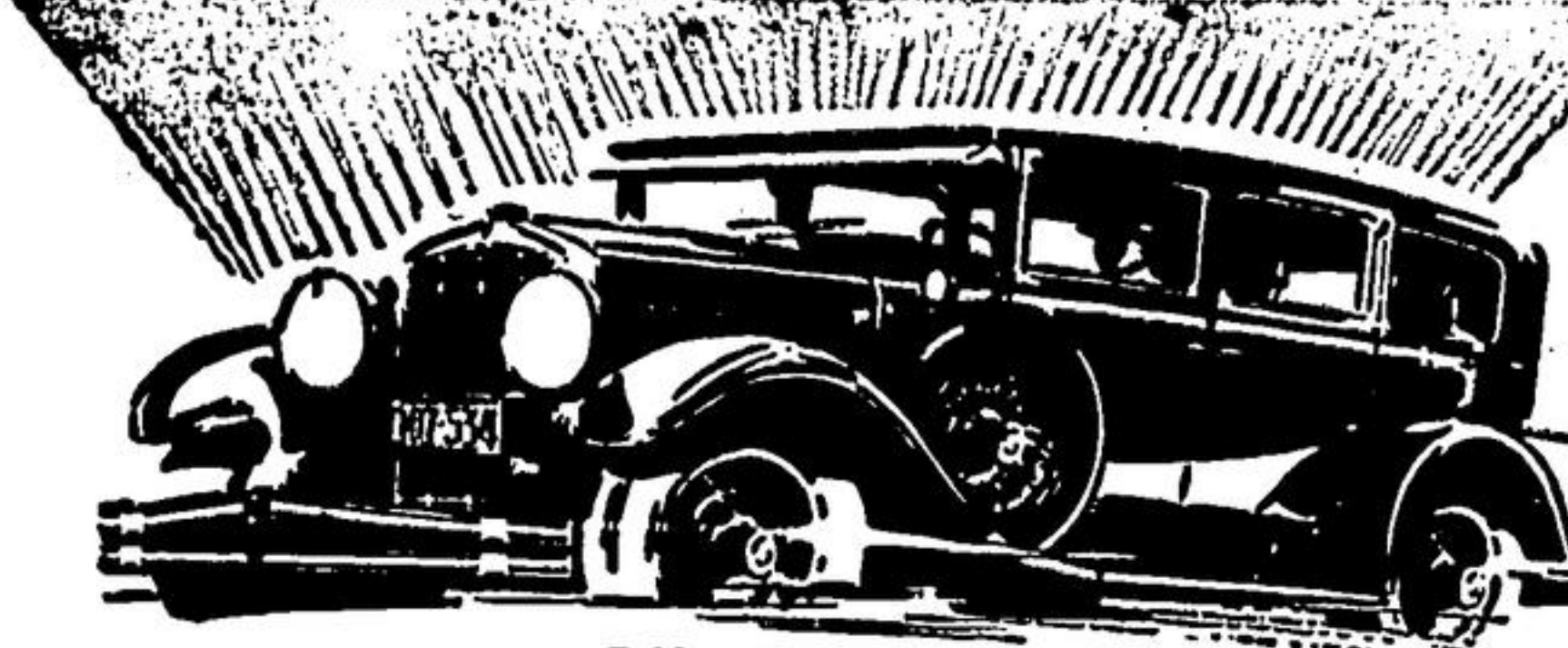
