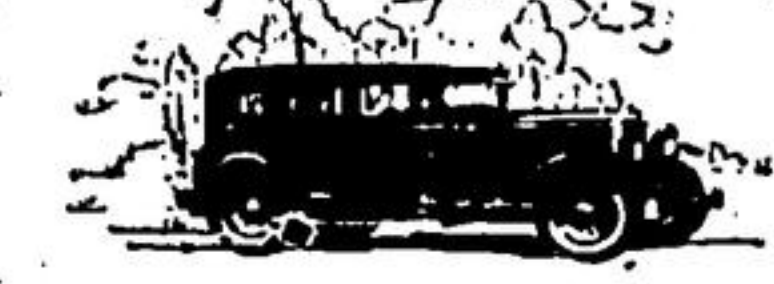

GENERAL NEWS

Burlington town council has passed a resolution asking that the extra gasolene tax be spent on road improvement.

Port Credit has decided to widen the lakeshore road (highway) to eighty-six feet. Enlarging widening will cost approximately \$80,000.

Richard Service, aged 59 years, died in Hamilton on Sunday last. He was born in Milton and had been a resident of Hamilton for the past 28 years.

It cost Dundas council during the month of March, the sum of \$50.00 for putting out grass fires, which had got beyond the control of citizens burning up grass.

Ratepayers of Burlington will vote on April 25th on the high school board application of \$77,500, to be used in building and equipping an addition to the present high school.

Alliston customs office was closed on April 1st and Collector McBride will be transferred to another post. Postmaster Joseph Whiteside has been appointed customs officer for Alliston.

Hydro is spreading in Trafalgar. In a few days residents on the seventh line back concession, sixth line and ninth line, will have the "juice" turned on and homes and barns will be brightly lighted.

At a meeting of the Peel County council the report of the Old People's Home for Milton and Peel recommended interior repairs at an estimated cost of \$500. At present there are 77 inmates, a reduction of 4 since January.

Oakville sporting fraternity were pleased to learn on Monday last that one of their citizens, Arthur Hillier, had been unanimously elected president of the Ontario Baseball Amateur Association at the annual meeting held in London.

The large barn of Charles Henry, well known farmer residing just south of Thornton, was totally destroyed by fire caused by lightning last Thursday morning. Included in the loss are twenty-eight head of pure bred Shorthorn and six horses.

Emerson Downs, who left Renfrew and went to Guelph recently to head the city band there, found the surroundings so un congenial that he gave up the position after a fortnight's trial and returned to Renfrew where he is again leading the band.

Reports from the Field Husbandry Department of the O.A.C. indicate a good year for fall wheat. This spring has been free from repeated mild spells followed by frosts which is the chief enemy of the crop, and the growth this year should be a good one.

The Public Health

Citizens are Requested to Comply With the Public Health Act

Notice is hereby given that all residents of Georgetown are required forthwith to clean their cellars, drains, yards, pig sties, water closets, outbuildings and other premises and remove therefrom all dirt, manure and other substances which may endanger the public health and to have same completely cleaned by the 15th day of May next, on which day the sanitary inspector will commence a general inspection; and further take notice that the section of the Public Health Act prohibiting the keeping of dogs between the 15th of May and the 15th of November except in pens at least 70 feet from any dwelling and 50 feet from any street or lane, with floors kept clean from all standing water and regularly cleaned will be strictly enforced.

All citizens are earnestly requested to keep their premises constantly clean and thoroughly disinfected.
