

Foundation of National Culture

Those who have in the past regarded the New Canadians from Europe as hewers of wood and drawers of water must, after the recent demonstration of their native arts, decidedly enhance the cultural wealth of the country of their adoption. J. Murray Gibson, who sponsored the festival under the auspices of the Canadian Pacific Railway, has gone far to show the diverse elements of our Prairie provinces here within their borders the foundation of a National culture lies more than that of any other nation on earth. 
LILIES AND LOLLIPOPS.





represent an inherent love for beautiful things and a love of melody. Weaving is ultimately linked up with handicraft, for it is to the accompaniment of folksong that the spinning wheel turns and the beautiful homespun fabrics are woven. These fabrics, however, may never be duplicated by the factory-made article, and the efforts of the Canadian Handicraft Guild to find an outlet in the market for the craftsmanship which can be done during the winter months in Western Canada is therefore well worthy of support. This year a special exhibit in connection with the Polkacong and Folkways Festival

which the Canadian Folkways organization is to hold at Regina, March 20-23rd, as the inauguration of Saskatchewan Branch. The purpose of the Great West festival is to help Canadians to realize the priceless heritage which they possess in the traditional folkways which have been brought to this country by immigrants, who in some cases have been composed of this country by early settlers. The folkways of the West, however, is only a sliver of it and is secured in the four days of this particular festival, but some of the greatest of its content will receive interpretations and it promises indeed to be a feast of music and color. Paul Bai, the Danish baritone will feature in Norse music, Charles Mandell, the Czech folk singer, folk songs and almost every nation will be represented in handicraft as in song. Fishermen differ as to the fighting merits of the various species of the many trout found throughout North American waters. Some claim that inch for inch and pound for pound the small mouth black beat the great lake fish. Others are equally enthusiastic in praise of the speckled brook trout, while still another fraternity claims that the brown runs up as far as the extent. All are agreed, however, that the muskellunge, sometimes called the "fish king," is indeed one of the greatest fighters known to anglers, and that he will put up a battle royal when attacked to the bone and end of a rod.

One of the most productive muskellunge streams in North America is French River, in Ontario, Canada, which connects Lake Nipigon on the East with Georgian Bay on the West. The tangle of waterways is not only the haunt of the fighting muskellunge, but it is likely to lurk.
