I remember reading, two or three years before the raid, a report of a military rifle match held, I am pretty certain, at LaPrairie, Que. The late Captain Johnson, of No. 2 Co. and at least one of his men. Henry Toat, were among the most auceasful competitors. In 1863 or 1864, I think, there was a lifle match here, or vather about a mile outside of the town, at the foot of the mountain, a little below the reservoir. I, as a youngster, watched the shooting, which continued for two or three days, No. 1 Co. was not represented, all the competitors, wearing red coats. Captain Johnson and Henry Toat figured prominently. Bo. I think, did Thos. Bell of No. 3, Bam. Morrow and George Black of No. 2 and, I think Wrank Taylor, of Georgetown. 
