**Emergency Crops  
 to fight weeds**

The late season has given weeds a start in many  
 fields. Do not seed improperly prepared land!  
 Good crops cannot be expected and weeds will  
 be encouraged.

To ensure probability of success in such fields,  
 and to control the weeds, take the necessary time  
 to cultivate properly, but use one of the later or  
 emergency crops. Buckwheat, for instance, yields  
 well, provides good food, and has a ready market.  
 This will pay you better than a weed-ridden crop!  
 Hay crops suggested are millet, oats and sweet  
 clover, or soybeans. A mixture of oats, peas and  
 vetches may be used for either hay or silage.  
 Rape is excellent for late pasture.

 advise you about suitable crops and date of seed-
