GENERAL NEWS

According to the recently returned roll of the Orangeville assessor the population of that town is 3715 and the total assessment is almost one million and a half.

Professor Day commenced cultivation of the Bradford marsh on Tuesday, April 22. This is two days earlier than last year, which he considers very favorable in view of the unusually wet spring.

Freel County Council held a short special session Friday when they appointed Reeve David Wilson of Albion, county clerk by an unanimous vote. Albert Manning, Sandhill, the only other applicant, withdrew his name.

Bolton village is mystified by the number of dead hens being found on the Glasgow Rd., evidently thrown there by the wind. It is some kind of "dope" too freely when they were taking them from the neighboring farmyards.

Thomas Knox, Campbell's Cross, while driving a span of young horses was badly hurt when they became frightened and bolted into a ditch. He was thrown about a distance of 20 feet, lighting on his right shoulder. His ear and scalp were torn.

Allison Township Council paid out \$66 in claims from farmers who have had sheep killed and worried by dogs. The sheep-killing menace is as serious in the northern township as it is in the southern township where drastic action is going to be taken.

Fifteen young horses, purchased by Hugh B. Wilson, seventh line, Trafalgar, during his recent trip to Ireland, have arrived in excellent condition after their long trip. They are promising colts and will be at once housed in the stables of the riding field stables.

Prospects for a bumper crop of strawberries in Canada this year are very bright, according to the Fruit Branch of the Canadian Food and Department of Agriculture. The strawberry season in Canada west and east extends from about the middle of May till nearly the end of August.

It was along a beautiful stretch of highway and the telephone line along the way was in the hands of repair men. One was driving and looking when a sudden alid spied the man climbing the telephone poles. "Ginger, just look at those fools," she exclaimed, "do they think I never drove a car before?"

Two hundred pounds of honey were discovered in Mitchell last week when a swarm of bees were taken from the third story of the Royal Bank building by Fred Stetson. The bees had made their nest in the roof of the building and had to be destroyed before the honey could be obtained.

An effort at equalization of assessment in Trafalgar township similar to that adopted by the County of Peel this year is being attempted. The north end of the Township of Trafalgar feels that the taxes levied there are not being assessed high enough. There is a movement to raise the assessment of the township \$550,000.

H. H. Bull and Son held another sale of fine and choice goods, jewelry, when seventy heads were sold at an average price of \$388. The total proceeds of the sale is not yet known. The late Mrs. C. M. Champs, a four-year-old calf, brought top price, selling to E. W. Nesbitt, Woodstock, for \$2400. Mr. Nesbitt paid \$100 for two other animals.

Here and There

An effort is being made to establish an airport at Banff, Alberta. Government officials have inspected the site and the prospect that a field will be prepared within the next year is bright.

A further supply of airplanes and airplane parts arrived in Montreal recently when the Canadian Pacific freighter "Hesperford" brought two De Havilland Moth planes, one case of wings and two cases of spare parts.

A call for tenders for a large elevator with a capacity of 1,500,000 bushels has been sent out by the Statist John Harbor Commission. The new structure is to be erected on the Colwell Fuel Company's site, in West Saint John, the work of construction to be not under way as soon as possible.

A Cadillac sedan equipped with rubber insulated steel flanged wheels has been speed tested by the Angus Shops of the Canadian Pacific Railway at Montreal for the use of the Province of Ontario. The machine has an extra braking system equipped with the tearing wheel and can make as great a speed on the rails as it can on the highway. Over seventy miles an hour was made on a trial run.

A big black bear tried to stop a Canadian Pacific freight train the other day near Aradale station in Nova Scotia. The bear was shot, and when the encounter was over there was not enough of the bear left to make a pair of mitts. Bruin evidently wandered on to the tracks during the night and was blinded by the glare of the headlights. Black bear are found throughout Eastern Canada but are not often seen, except during the berry season, as they are night prowlers.

Addressing the Board of Trade of Vancouver, recently, E. W. Beatty, Chairman and President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, stated that present prosperity in Canada is clearly indicated by four main factors: Record of railway car loadings (showing the volume of business), employment returns, reports of financial houses and building construction. These indices were of special value, he remarked, because of the wide range of activities which they reflect. The gross earnings of the company, he added, had been greatly "derated" by losses of reduced freight rates.

A unique piece of railway equipment, a dynamometer car, has been constructed by the Angus shops for the Canadian Pacific Railway. The apparatus is intended to test the efficiency of locomotives at various speeds and is placed between the tender and the engine during operation. The forces exerted on the coupler of the car are transmitted hydraulically to an instrument known as a chronograph, which records upon a moving sheet of paper. It is stronger by far than any of its predecessors and is said to be the finest car of its kind on the continent. One of its first tests will be the test of the new "3100" passenger locomotive of the C. P. R., the largest engine in the British Empire.
