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**IN MEMORIAM**

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**Women's Missionary Society**

**MEET IN KNOX PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH HERE ON TUESDAY**

The fourteenth Annual Meeting of the Women's Missionary Society was held in Knox Presbyterian Church on Tuesday evening, June 18th. After devotional services and greetings from Mrs. K. MacLean, the morning session was taken up with business relative to work of the society in the future. Auxiliary activities. Mrs. G. H. Dawson of Stewarstown gave an interesting talk on Stewarstown.

At the afternoon session the President, Mrs. J. A. Hill, Toronto gave a report of the meeting. The report of the Council held in Ottawa in which the keynote was "Advance". Miss Edith Rinehart, Clerk, Work Sections, discussed the need of better training in the home for the young. They are being disillusioned by false standards of living and by the lives of many professing Christians. There is not enough of the good old-fashioned home being taught in the home. Bibles were sung by Mrs. Fred Thompson, Miss Ruth Anderson, and Mrs. D. McClure, Norval, accompanied by Mrs. H. B. Henderson, Winnipeg.

**Inspector Approves Ferguson's Plan**

Inspector Denyes approves of the Ferguson plan to do junior collegiate work in public schools. "Of course, it is not to be supposed that it should be done in all rural schools," he said. "That would be costly and impractical. The average township has but very few entrance pupils. But it would be practicable, if we had the township board plan, to name a school for each of three or four school sections where these senior pupils could be sent, and then centralized for this high school work without taking them too far from their homes."

As things are now, it was remarked, no section wants to send its children to a school in another section, and so long as there is the small section system of school government, it will not be easy to transfer this collegiate work to the public schools.

"Look at it this way," said Mr. Denyes. "There are seventeen school sections in this township. Three trustees to every section, 51 in all to govern the public schools of the township. Yet all the other affairs of Trifalgar township are looked after by five men, the trustees of the township. It would not be more than ten men, and we would be able to get the best education in school administration. It would not be so sectional. We would be able to have school health, farm economics, manual, household science, manual training, and so on."
