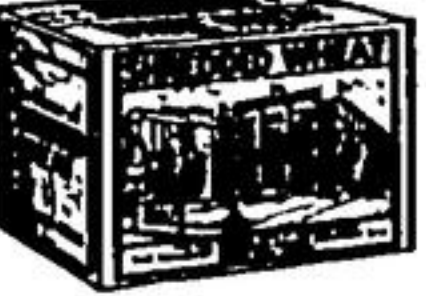

OF INTEREST TO CADETS
James Forbes Evans, son of Mr. W. R. Evans, son of the late Mr. James Forbes Evans, is competing in the Ontario Silver Medal Rifle Competition which was held recently at Georgetown. His score was 1000. He was sent in to Headquarters and the medal with his name engraved thereon, will be ready for him at the end of the week.
The Cadet Camp, which will be held at Niagara-on-the-Lake, will commence on Thursday, July 4th, 1929. The following instructions have been issued for the benefit of cadets attending camp.
Cadets attending camp will receive free transportation to and from camp. Cash equipment, including rubber sheets, blankets, etc., will be provided in necessary quantities. Meals and incidentals will be provided by a competent caterer and the interests of the cadets will be carefully looked after so that they need have no anxiety about their boys while in camp. The training of the cadets will include physical training, marksmanship, drill, rifle shooting, and signalling instruction. The usual sports and games will be held during camp.
Each cadet attending will be required to bring with him into camp a uniform, a 303 D.P. rifle, a pair of boots, a hat, a pair of socks, a pair of soap, toothbrush, 2 towels, shoe brush and polish, clothes brush or whisk, needle, and comb. Each cadet should pack his kit in a small valve or kit bag and attach to it a tag bearing his name and cadet to which he belongs.
Georgetown High School Cadet Corps is allowed to send twelve cadets. Those who are interested in attending should apply to the chairman of the committee which purchased the building site.
