Prisoners Escaped From Milton Jail

Picked Locks of Cells With Ordinary Table Knife

One Prisoner Escaped and Given Two Years Additional Time

Two prisoners in the Milton county jail at Milton, picked the locks of their cells with an ordinary table knife, threw a blanket over the head of the 78-year-old governor McGibbon of the institution and taking the governor's Winchester revolver from his desk in his office, made a dash for it across the town park at about 8 o'clock Sunday night.

Fifteen minutes after Provincial Constable Geo. Cookman learned of the escape he had led a party of the male population of Milton organized into the largest man hunt in the history of the town. The party opposite the jail was thoroughly combated, automobiles loaded with armed men were dispatched along the high ways and side lines and warnings given to all surrounding points, but the fugitives so far eluded the search.

Joseph McCann, 25, Toronto, one of the escaped prisoners, was sentenced to two years term in the reformatory on a serious offence against a Georgetown girl. He has been kept in local lock-up 20 days pending an appeal. He had decided to drop the appeal and was to be taken to Kingston on the 20th inst. However, McCann had been changed to his dearest friend, William King, 30, awaiting trial at the fall assizes charged with a serious offence. This was the other prisoner who escaped.

The men were in separate cells in the same room in the reformatory. One of the men had secreted an ordinary kitchen knife in the cell and by thrusting his hand through the grating managed to open the lock and then freed his companion. One of the men was shot at by a trustee, Jim Forbes and Tom Bonna, in the kitchen some distance away that there was a struggle in the kitchen.
