Here and There

(370) Two scholarships at McGill University, Montreal, covering five years' tuition for employees who are minors or minor sons of employees have been awarded by the Canadian Pacific Railway this year, one to C. P. Sturdee, son of E. F. L. Sturdee, assistant general passenger agent and the other to William P. Dunlop, son of John Dunlop of the pension department of the railway at the head office of the company. The scholarships provide for one year's tuition in the faculty of arts followed by four years' tuition in architecture, chemical, civil, mechanical or electrical engineering.

Hugh Hon. Winair Churchill, Chamberlain of the Exchequer in the late Baldwin Government in Great Britain, arrived in Canada recently on the Empress of Australia and made a tour of the country from Montreal to Victoria. He visited Toronto, Hamilton, Niagara Falls, Winnipeg, Regina, Edmonton, Calgary, Banff, Lake Louise, Sicamous, Vancouver and Victoria. He will leave the latter city September 5 arriving at Seattle the same evening. He travelled Canadian Pacific railway and steamships during the whole of his trip.

Purchased for a sum in excess of \$50,000, an oil painting of Lord Peterborough by Sir Anthony Van Dyck, court painter to King Charles I, was carried by the Canadian Pacific Express Company by steamer Montreal to Montreal recently, very special precautions being taken to ensure safe delivery. It was bought by A. J. Nesbitt, prominent business leader of Montreal.

Commercial apple crop in the province of Nova Scotia this year will total about 1,500,000 barrels, about 450,000 barrels more than last year. The Ontario crop is estimated at 70,000 barrels, up 210,000 barrels over 1928. The British Columbia crop is placed at 3,538,100 boxes, about 10 per cent. less than last year. The raspberry crop is reported good all over the Dominion.

"CHALLENGER OF STEAM"

Railroad motive power development took another important step forward when the electric locomotive No. 2000 of the Canadian National Railways made its inaugural run between Montreal and Toronto, hauling a section of the famous "International Limited", over all-steel train which operates between Montreal, Toronto, Detroit and Chicago. The new motive power unit emerged with honors from the grilling test, hauling the heavy train at high speed over the 340 miles of line and in some places attaining a speed in excess of eighty miles per hour. Experts who were aboard the train expressed the opinion that eventually this type of motive power will supersede the steam locomotive.

Locomotive 2000, which is 84 feet in length, and weighs 310 tons fully equipped, develops 3000 horse power. It consists of two units, each powered with an oil engine generator, which in turn delivers power to the electric propulsion motors which operate the train.

Canadian National engineers have discovered that with this engine seven times the power is secured from a unit of heat generated by fuel oil as against heat generated in a steam locomotive by use of coal.

Produced 15 tons of milk



Strathmore Sylvia, prize pure-bred Holstein from the Canadian Pacific Railway Experimental Farm at Strathmore, Alberta, held the record of all Canada last year for her production of 23,271 pounds of milk and 1287 pounds of butter. She had her day-out at the Calgary Exhibition and Stampede at Calgary recently, when with others from the herd of 400 at the farm she was admired by thousands of visitors. Just to impress on them what she had done, 370 eight-gallon milk cans were arranged around the entire Canadian Pacific Holstein exhibit, these being the number required to hold the milk Sylvia produced. 1287 one-pound butter cartons formed an arch at one end, emphasizing her butter production.
