The tardy bridge-player will be told "Sorry—there's no one on the line now, Madam." Both of them will be annoyed—the person calling and the person called. Both of them have wasted time. See Responsible for Father's Death A coroner's jury inquiring at Oakville on Monday into the death of Charles Edward Durham, of Toronto, returned a verdict as follows: "We are of the opinion that the death of Charles Edward Durham, of Toronto, received in an automobile accident on the morning of September 6, in a car driven by his son, Fred Durham, at an excessive rate of speed." Fred Durham is out on bail on a charge of manslaughter. He will appear shortly in County Court at Oakville. Edward Walker, who was injured in the accident, is in the Joseph's Hospital. Traffic Officer Iason who investigated the accident after the crash, testified that Walker had been intoxicated.
