CORRESPONDENCE

To the Editors of Halton County: The approach of the Ontario election brings every thoughtful citizen of the province to a serious consideration of the various policies of government offered by the Government of Ontario.

There is before the people one question which transcends all others in its importance, because of its bearing on human life itself. This question is the method of dealing with intoxicating liquors.

The leading statement of this province have for many years given deep thought to this perplexing question. Again and again new policies have been suggested and tried, always with the earnest hope and belief in improved conditions. Perhaps few men have faced this question with greater natural ability and prolonged thought than the present prime minister, and apparently few statesmen had greater confidence in his proposed legislation than Premier Ferguson in the L.O.A. The Act has been on trial for two and one half years and the question now arises is it satisfactory? To this the premier answers that it is not, but that further amendments may make it so; but the prime minister has no thought of changing the central principle of the Act which is that the Ontario Government sells liquors to anyone until he becomes disqualified. Those who are responsible for this belief believe that the present policy of the Ontario Government on this question is not the wisest policy that could be adopted. The country has been in a state of confusion, and has been struck, efficient, capable and satisfactory in many ways, indeed in almost every way with this one exception, but the country is not in accord with the well-being of the province and the good name of its people that we give an early opportunity to use our influence for a change of policy here. If the Government would now change its policy in this particular, it would find warm friends among us, but we cannot agree that the Government should sell liquor, because the responsibility and honor of the province is involved in all that the Government does.
