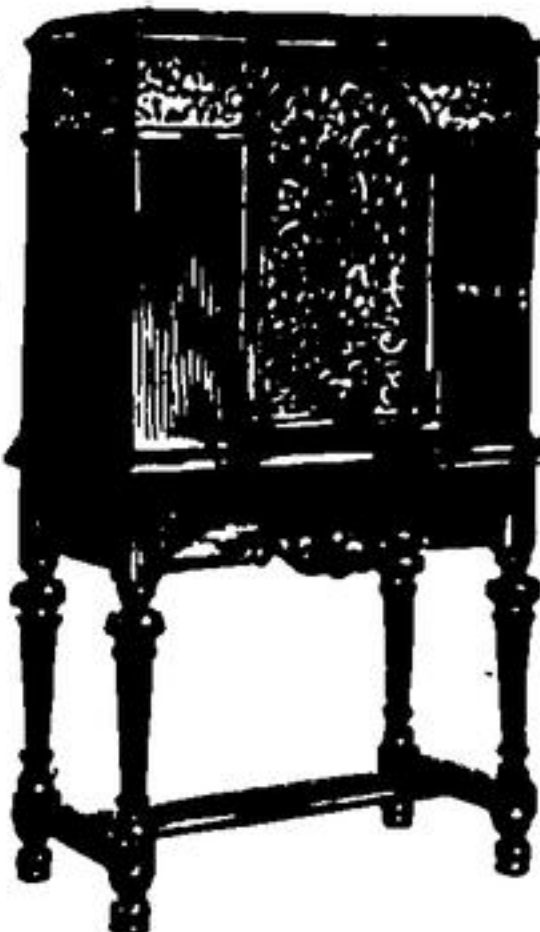

Don't Sow Oats on Fields Infested with Sow Thistle

"Don't sow oats on fields infested with sow thistle. Rather sow clover, which when very dry, and work thoroughly," is the advice of one farmer who has had experience with this noxious weed. Sow thistle, as well as other thistles thrive in oats better than in any other crop. It does not show up very much in wheat or clover. Sow weed infested fields to any of the clovers and cut twice a year. By following this course, sow thistle will be largely eliminated.
