was impossible to keep up 17 miles of road with \$2000. They had done the best possible with the amount at their disposal.

Councillor A. B. Parr, chairman of the Waterworks and Fire Committee had a surplus in his department for the year. He did not think it fair that some paid their taxes while others did not; and was in favor of taking action on collected arrears.

Councillor Harold Cleave, chairman of building and property committee had done his best to practice economy. Very little had been spent on public buildings and parks as we have a good town and should spend money to keep it in good shape. He referred to the appointment of a Cemetery Board, and the work of the Local Council of Women in connection with perpetual care of cemetery. If elected he would work in best interests of the town.

Councillor George Davis, chairman of the charity committee, referred to the large amount paid for charity, and the Public Schools, as they were opposed to paying. He also spoke regarding arrears due the town by some who had the Housing Commission.

Mr. R. B. Foulis, chairman of the Public School Board was pleased to state that after all expenditures for the year had been met there was a balance of \$600 in the treasury. He referred to the harmony existing and good work being accomplished at the Public School and invited the teachers to come and visit the school. Next year he expected there would be an expenditure of about \$500 in lavatories, as those now being used were unsanitary, and it was absolutely essential that there be healthy surroundings for the children. A physical instructor has been added to the Public School.

Mr. L. F. Denison thanked his mover and seconder as he had not expected to be nominated. He spoke briefly regarding the upkeep of roads, building of park, and collection of taxes.

Mr. Neil Cummings said conditions at his end of the town were bad, especially in the County. He was at times impassable. He had been asked to stand and if elected his main effort would be for better roads in Ward Two.

West of the Great Lakes

THE growth of the Bank of Montreal has closely coincided with the gradual development of Canada from a small colony to a great Dominion.
