A splendid season is reported by the farmers of Ontario, according to the current weekly crop report. Farmers in Dundas and Halton counties are reporting a good crop and splendid markets for eggs, which are selling locally at 8¢ for extra and 4¢ for first class.

Essex County's crop is reported to be good, though, and although prices are no higher than last year, the average is considerably higher.

Wheat is looking well in Huron, although drought has delayed its ripening somewhat.

There has been considerable demand in the County of Haldimand for cattle. American buyers have been quite active, particularly in the more southerly types of limestone. Middlesex County has been less fortunate, owing to drought and large numbers of live stock are still on pasture. Sheep are reported to be in good condition.

Tenikaming sheepmen being of the opinion that flocks were never in better condition than they are this fall.
