

Pifty different ateamship lines now serve to carry Canadian products to every continent from the port of Vancouver, states a recent trade review issued by the Royal Bank of Canada. The review adds that in a period when the other great ports have had difficulty in maintaining their pre-war volume of trade, traffic through the port of Vancouver has experienced steady growth. From 132 oceangoing ahips in 1913, the number increased to 1,344 in 1928. During the past year total trade of the port had a value of \$240,000,000.

The largest sugar best crop on record in Southern Alberta is heing harvested in the Raymond district, centre of the industry. About 8.500 acres were sown to sugar beets this year, 2,000 more than in 1928 and the crop will on estimate yield about 65.000 tons or 23,000 above last year's production.

Cable advices from London state that Captain Ronald Stuart. V.C., D.S.O., U.S.N.C., R.N.R., commander of the Canadian Pacific liner "Duchess of York." has been officially selected to attend the Armistice Day ceremonies at the Cenotaph in London. Captain Stuart 's one of the youngest liner captains on the North Atlantic and the only nassenger ship captain to wear the Victoria Cross. It is expected that he will also be present at the Prince of Wates' dinner to V.Ca.


