### GENERAL NEWS

Mr. Hugh McEvoy, one of Mark-  
dale's prominent and highly respected  
business men passed away early  
Friday morning, December 18th, after  
a trying illness of two months. He was  
born in 1858 and was 71 years of age.  
Jack pine is now used more than any  
other species for ties in Canada. Its  
adaptability to these conditions and its
