DEAUGHTS A hugest draught people are draughts. A draught is a current of air which, striking one part of the body, cools it while the rest of the body remains warm. We can stand out of doors in a good stiff breeze and feel good out of the draught. If, however, we have a perceptible breeze strike only one part of the body, or if a stiff breeze billows in the face, the draught is apt to be followed by discomfort in the part thus affected. A draught of cold in the head may follow. There is no question but that some people are more sensitive to draughts than are others. Fear of draught should not lead to our living a life shut off from fresh air, living in over-heated rooms, with the air absolutely still. It is to be avoided, for it has a definite effect on the body. It is quite practical to keep the air in a room in the gentle motion which comfort and good health demand without draughts. The motion of air which does not strike and chill one part of the body is an essential of good air and makes a desirable atmosphere in which to live.
